NATIONAL FOREST TIMBER FOR SALE, UMATILLA NATIONAL FOREST, DUCKY LP TIMBER SALE, located withing T. 4 S., R. 29 E., T. 5 S., R. 29 E., W.M. surveyed. SEALED BIDS will be received by the District Ranger or his representative, Heppner Ranger District, P.O. Box 7, Heppner, OR 97836, up to and not later than 10:00 a.m., local time, at place of bid opening, December 2, 1985, followed immediately by oral bidding for an estimated 1,300 M board feet of timber marked or otherwise designated for cutting. The minimum acceptable bid per M board feet is: Lodgepole pine fiberwood, \$3.63. Additional deposit required for slash disposal is \$3.30 per M board feet for all species. Additional deposit required for road maintenance on National Forest roads over the appraised route is \$5.76 per M board feet for all species logs priced per M board feet. The contract includes a description of the maintenance work by roads. In the event that the total bid value, plus required deposits for this contract exceed one million dollars (\$1,000,000), an EEO compliance review will be conducted on the high bidder to determine if the provisions of Executive Order 11246 as amended by Executive Order 11375, have been complied with before award can be made. Timber included in this contract is subject to the log export and substitution restrictions of 36 CFR 223.10. Bidders are required by 36 CFR 223.5 to complete a Certification of Nonsubstitution of Timber Purchased (Part I of form FS-2400-43) and submit the information for the tributary area in Part II of the form. Failure to properly complete and sign Part I of form FS-2400-43 will result in the bid being rejected as non-responsive. Bidders are advised that violations of the domestic processing requirement constitute breach of contract and may result in contract cancellation, or in refusal to award timber sales to the violator, or debarment or suspension from bidding on future timber sales. The required bid guarantee is \$300.00. The high bidder whose bid is accepted must, within 30 days or written notification, furnish a cash deposit, or provide effective purchaser credit in the amount of 10 percent of total bid value rounded up to the next \$100. This sale is set aside for small business firms with 25 or fewer employees. Bids from others will be considered only if no valid bid is received from a qualifying small business concern. The right to reject any and all bids is reserved. The Ione Cardinals met the loggers from Mitchell on Friday Oct. 25 in a non-league football showdown. The Cards, behind the 211 yards rushing by Ken Snider, came away with their second win of the season, posting a 44-8 victory over the Loggers.

Ione took the opening kickoff down the field and Rod Taylor culminated a seven play drive with a touchdown plunge of four yards. Taylor was used sparingly as a running back as Ione took a page from the Chicago Bears' play book. Later on in the first quarter, Eric Pointer ran in from three yards out and with another successful two-part conversion, the Cards led 16-0 after the first period.

Both teams went scoreless in the second quarter and Ione took their 16-0 lead to the locker-room at the half.

The Cardinals came out after halftime fired up. They scored two touchdowns in the third quarter, the first on an 11 yard run by Snider, who also recovered a Logger fumble in the end-zone for six more. Ione added one extra point on a pass from Snider to Pointer and lead 30-0 after three.

The Cardinal luck continued into the fourth as Snider scored his third touchdown and Pointer got his second two-point conversion. Finally, Dick McElligott capped Ione's scoring for the game with a one yard

plunge for his first touchdown of the year.

Coach Kip Norris commented, "I was pleased with the young players performance. Our offense looked good. We executed well so most of our plays worked. Overall, I was very pleased."

Ione will face the Arlington Honkers in their Homecoming game this Friday, Nov. 1.
