

Fillies earn chance at state title

By defeating the Pine Eagle Spartan 9-15, 15-4, 15-13 in the regional tournament on Saturday, Nov. 2 the Heppner Fillies advanced to this weekend's state volleyball tournament.

Pine Eagle took the first game by a 15-9 count. "It seemed that we had all of the playoff jitters in the first game," replied Heppner head coach Julie Reynolds. "Our first game was by far our worst serving game of the season. When we serve well, we play well, but we just didn't serve

well." The Fillies came back to win the second game 15-4 behind the play of senior Missy Gates. "The need to win the second game brought out everybody's natural ability," replied Reynolds. "Missy played her best game of the year and really gave an excellent performance," the coach added. Reynolds also cited Missy Eubanks and Dana Reid for an excellent job of blocking Spartans' hits. Heppner went on to win the third game 15-13 advancing to the state tournament. "By the third game we

had all of the jitters out of our system and just went out and played volleyball," commented Reynolds. "I believe that this was our best total team effort of the season," she concluded.

The state tournament will be held at the Child's Center on the campus of the University of Portland on Friday, Nov. 8 and Saturday, Nov. 9. Heppner will meet Lutheran at 11 a.m. on Friday. This is an eight-team, double elimination tournament. The state championship match will begin at 6:45 p.m. on Saturday.
