Census updated

There may be as many as 30 to 50 million species of insects on Earth - at least five times more than previously estimated, reports National Wildlife magazine. The census update is based on the results of the first survey of insects living high up in the trees of a tropical rain forest.

Resident Soil scientist named Kenny — Thompson

Donald Wysocki is the Oregon State University Extension Service's new resident soil scientist in eastern Oregon.

Wysocki, formerly a faculty member at Iowa State University, Ames, has accepted an Extension position as a soil management specialist at the Columbia Basin Agricultural Research Center in Umatilla County near Pendleton.

In his new position, Wysocki will work alongside USDA Agricultural Research Service soil and crop scientists who are developing cropping systems that deliver maximum yields and improved soil and water conservation, said O.E. Smith, OSU Extension Service director.

Wysocki's specific assignment will be to conduct Extension education programs in soil management for county agents, other agricultural agencies, growers, and fertilizer industry representatives in the region, Smith added.

The new specialist will also have responsibility for the coordination of STEEP (Solutions To Economic and Environmental Problems) erosion control Extension activities in the Columbia Basin region of Oregon.

Prior to joining the OSU Extension Service, Wysocki taught soil science courses in the Agronomy Dept. at Iowa State University for three years. Before that, he was a graduate teaching assistant at ISU in the same department while working on his Ph.D. degree.

Wysocki earned a bachelor's degree in resource management at the University of Wisconsin-Stevens Point, in 1974. He completed work on a master's degree in soil science at Washington State University, Pullman in 1977 and was employed by the Soil Conservation Service mapping soils in both Stevens and Franklin counties, Washington. The new specialist received his doctor's degree in soil morphology and genesis from Iowa State University in 1983.

Wysocki will work out of offices in the Columbia Basin Agricultural Research Center.
