If you plan to give your child a BB gun or other shooting device or if you allow your child to play with such devices, please, keep the following information in mind.

It shall be unlawful for any person to discharge an air gun or to use any bean shooter, slingshot or other similar weapon within the corporate limits of the City of Heppner. (Chapter 1 Section 10-1-2)

Any person violating any of the provisions of this chapter, upon conviction thereof, shall be punished by a forfeiture of not less than five dollars nor more than one hundred dollars.
