George A. Corwin

George A. Corwin, 80, well-known in Salem for his years as a volunteer, died January 1, 1986.

Born in Betteravia, Calif., Corwin moved to Salem with his wife, Juliet, in 1970, when he retired after serving 12 years as school superintendent in Winston-Dillard near Roseburg. He also had been superintendent in the Oregon cities of Colton, Boardman from 1937-42, Monmouth-Independence, Hood River, and from 1942-47 at Heppner.

In 1976, Corwin received the first Willard C. Marshall award, presented to the Citizen Volunteer of the Year.

The Salem Area Chamber of Commerce honored him with its Distinguished Service Award.

Corwin's community service included being past president of Salem Area Seniors, past director of Volunteers for Nursing Homes, past president of the former Volunteer Bureau, coordinator of what is now United Seniors, and memberships on the Salem city budget committee and a tri-county senior services advisory committee. He promoted tax levies for the Salem transit system.

Survivors include his wife, Juliet F.; sons James of Albany, and Stephen, of San Jose, Calif.; and daughters Joan C. LaFreniere, of Salem, and Claire Durland, of Portland.

Services were conducted at St. Paul's Episcopal Church, arrangements by Virgil T. Golden mortuary.

Seat belts mandatory for passengers 16 and under

A driver can be cited for \$50 per violation if passengers under 16 are not buckled into seat belts says Morrow County District Attorney Richard McNeerney. The law requiring use of seat belts went into effect January 1 along with several other changes in traffic laws.

Some have just been rewritten or the penalties changed, he says. Habitual Traffic Offenders, those with more than 20 minor traffic infractions in five years are three major infractions, may now have their driving privileges revoked for five years which is shortened from the previous time for license suspension. HTO is now a Class C felony; it was a misdemeanor until January 1.

Because the Drunk Driving Law and other traffic law changes are included in the current drivers manual along with policy changes in the Department of Motor Vehicles, McNeerney recommends that drivers pick up a copy of the current manual and read it, especially if it has been awhile since they have done so.

Glenn C. Jones

Private services have been held for Glenn C. Jones, 95, of Medford who died Sunday at a local nursing home. Arrangements are under the direction of Perl Funeral Home. Private inurnment will be held at Portland Memorial.

Jones was born January 17, 1890 and raised in Heppner. His parents were early pioneers of eastern Oregon. He was a graduate of Oregon Agricultural College, now Oregon State University, majoring in Business. He entered the Navy in 1918 and was honorably discharged in 1919. Jones worked as a rancher for many years in Heppner.

He married Florence E. Dooley June 11, 1927 in Stevenson, Washington; she preceded him in death in 1978. He continued to operate his ranches in Heppner until 1948. In 1941 he moved to Portland where he worked for M. Ruetter and Sons, a metal fabrication firm, and retired in 1964.

He was a life member (67 years) of the Heppner B.P.O.E. Lodge No. 358.

Survivors include one son, William G. Jones of Medford, one daughter, Phyllis J. Nearheim of Bellevue, Washington, four grandchildren, one great grandchild, one brother, Alva Jones of Heppner, and one sister, Ina Hendrickson of Sanleandro, California.

Thursday, Jan. 12, 1961 - "A new operator on an old ranch was chosen last week for 1960 Livestock Man of the Year.

"Don and Colleen Greenup, with their five children all work to make livestock growing a success. Mrs. Greenup was born and raised on the home ranch, nine miles east of Heppner on Hinton Creek, which has been in the Kilkenny family for 50 years. The Livestockman title was earned by the family through a steady increase in the improvements of the beef herd and the development of a registered flock of Suffolk ewes known for their breeding and quality thruout the Pacific Northwest."
