## Mustangs clobber Rockets, 82-41

In a showdown for the top spot in the Columbia Basin Conference Eastern Division, the Heppner boys basketball team prevailed 82-45 over the Umatilla Vikings on Saturday, Jan. 18.

Heppner now sports a 3-1 record in CBC action, but more importantly, is 3-0 against Eastern Division teams with eight games remaining. Overall, the Mustangs are 6-5.

"This was a win we had to have," said an ecstatic Heppner coach Brent Eggers. "We now have to take one game at a time and are in control of our own destiny," he added.

The Mustangs wasted little time in dealing with the Vikings, jumping out to an 18-9 first period margin.

Tony Clement tallied eight points and Wayne Wilgers calculated six more for the Mustangs.

Umatilla managed a 10-8 second quarter gain to pull within 26-19 by the break. But the spotlight belonged to Clement. The 6 ft. 2 in. senior gave the home crowd a thrill with a slam dunk a the 1:32 mark in the quarter.

Early in the third period the Vikings pulled to within 26-25 and Heppner looked in trouble as they were held without a field goal for the first 3:44.

But from there Heppner went on a 14-2 string, pulling up with a 40-27 advantage after the third period.

Wilgers chipped in 10 points during the fourth quarter and Duane Ball made 4 of 7 free throws as the

buige. "We are improving every game and hopefully we'll be able to continue that," commented Eggers.

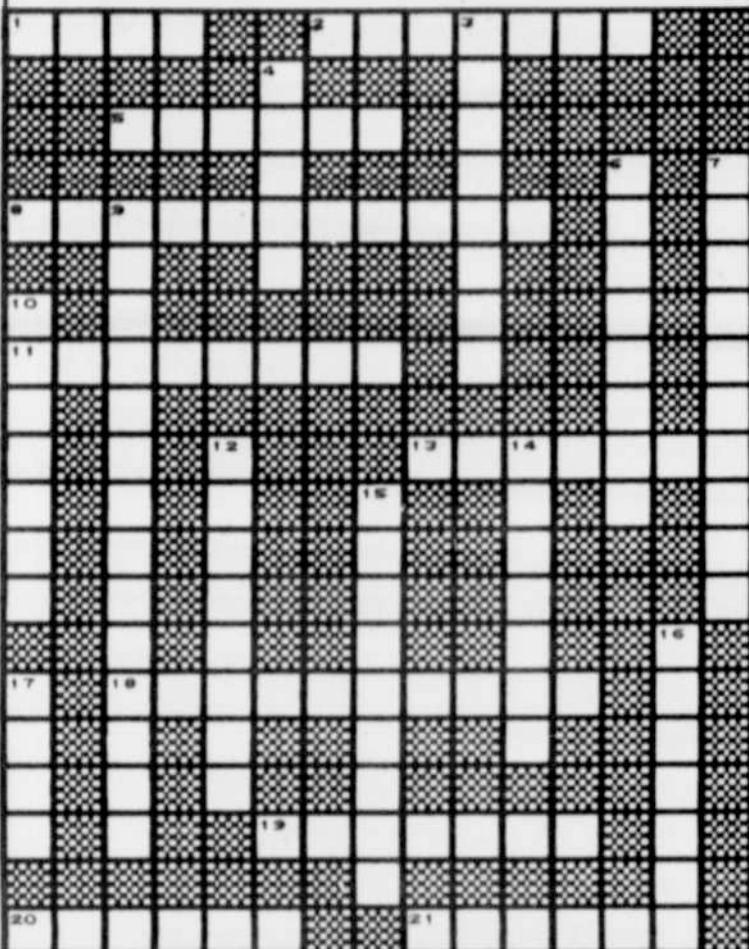

The Heppner Fillies hosted the Umatilla Vikings Saturday, Jan. 18, for their fourth league win.

The Fillies started off in a full court press against the Vikings, falling back into a tough 13 defense.

Heppner led at the end of the first quarter only by seven points. In the second quarter the Fillies gained a few more points to lead at half time 34-24.

The Fillies only took a 10 point lead which left it either team's game.

Heppner poured on the heat in the third quarter and left Umatilla behind as they galloped into an easy 27 point win.

The Fillies had a little foul trouble and finished the game with a total of 29 fouls, 10 more than Umatilla.

With one of Heppner's starters and

reserves fouling out early in the fourth quarter and the other starters sitting down, the Fillies' reserves stepped in to increase the lead.

A full team effort left the Fillies with 4-0 league record, leading the Columbia Basin Conference.

Coach Royer felt Heppner's fast break was a big asset to the win. "Umatilla played us well in the first half, but we tightened up the defense and got our break going in the third quarter and that was the turning point," said Royer.

"We also had players come off the bench and do a good job in the fourth quarter," concluded Royer.

Lana Reid put in 19 points and pulled down 9 rebounds to lead the Fillies while Missy Eubanks had 15 points, 11 rebounds and 7 steals. Missy Turner led the assists for Heppner, passing out 8.

Deana Adams led Umatilla with 17 points.
