

Mustangs squander 19-point lead

It was the best of times; it was the worst of times. Unfortunately for Heppner's boys varsity basketball team, the latter prevailed on Friday, Feb. 7 when the Mustangs squandered a 19-point lead to the Wasco County Redside and lost by a 54-49 count.

The teams traded baskets in the first period and the Mustangs man-

still trailed 45-31 entering the fourth period.

Heppner totally fell apart in the fourth period, being outscored 23-4 by Wasco County.

The Redside kept chipping away at the Mustang lead, whittling it to nine points, seven, five, two, and then, with 2:39 left in the contest, Jim Duncan hit a shot to knot the score 49-49.

Thirty-seven seconds later Johnson gave Wasco County a 51-40 lead, the first time the Redside led since going on top 2-0 to start the game.

Another basket by Duncan and free throw by Stacey Hammer allowed Wasco County to escape with a 54-40 win.

"It's a shame we had to lose after we played great for three quarters," said Heppner coach Brent Eggers. "Our offensive and defensive execution totally broke down."

"We lost partly due to fatigue and partly due to lack of concentration. Their depth wore us out. It's nice for Wasco County to have all 12 players back from last year's district championship team."

Wilgers and Todd Lindsay each netted 17 points to lead the Mustangs. Hull had 11 points and Duncan and Randy Iverson each added 10 more for the Redside.

Lindsay led Heppner's 32-31 advantage on the boards, collecting 9. Duane Ball handed out seven assists (all in the first half) and Lindsay gave out six. The Mustangs were hampered by 23 turnovers, 17 in the last half.

Heppner shot better from the field, 51 percent, than from the charity stripe, 50 percent. Wasco County also shot better from the floor, 42 percent, than from the line, 40 percent.
