Sheriff summarizes year's business

Morrow County Sheriff Roy Drago has submitted the following summary of business handled by the sheriff's office between January 1 and December 31, 1985.

Cases handled by type of crime: Bank Robbery-1, Burglary-31, Theft-55, Unauthorized Use Motor Vehicle-5, Recovered Stolen Vehicle-2, Criminal Mischief-30, Criminal Trespass-4, Forgery-2, Negotiating Bad Checks-Worthless Document-5, Counterfeit Money-1, Drugs, Marijuana, Seizure-5, Assault, Menacing, Reckless Endangering-18, Rape-5, Sodomy-1, Sexual Abuse-1, Child Abuse, Neglect, Endanger a Minor-1 Fugitive Arrests-28, Driving Under the Influence Intoxicants-24, Felony Driving While Revoked-4, Hit and Run-4, Unattended Death-7, Miscellaneous-47, (includes Livestock at Large, Maintain Public Nuisance, Assist Other Agency, Transports to Eastern Oregon State Hospital, Furnish Alcohol to Minor, Driving While Suspended, Runaway Juveniles, etc.) Dispatcher-Handled-189 (Includes Computer Entry of Stolen Property, Assist Other Agencies, Warrant Arrest by Other Agencies, Entering Restraining Orders, Runaway Juveniles, Missing Persons, etc.)

Other activities included: Poly-graph exams-18, Citations Issued-362, Traffic Warnings Issued-845, Civil Process Served-1977, Civil Process Attempts-481, Total Custody Arrests-101, Total Miles Driven-226,

301. An average of 5.4 civil papers were served each day. An average of 620 miles were driven each day. 14.6 miles per gallon was the average overall. These figures based on 365 days per year.

Prisoner transports are listed as follows: Total prisoners transported - 117, Total number of transports-187 Total man hours used-776, Total miles driven-34,301. Officers were tied up in transporting an average of 4.1 hours per transport. Average miles driven were 183.4 per transport. Each prisoner was transported an average of 1.6 times.

These time, mileage and transport figures also include the lone Bank Robbery investigation which caused considerable strain on the department's resources—specifically overtime, court time, transport hours,

etc.

On May 7, 1985, the Grand Jury handed down 23 count indictments on 10 individuals for charges ranging from Sale of Controlled Substance, Conspiracy for Sale and Possession of Controlled Substance. This ended a two month undercover operation in the Boardman area conducted by the Sheriff's Office. The 10 suspects have been arrested and charged. We were also instrumental in bringing about 3 arrests in Umatilla city for the same charges on these people. Of the 10 persons arrested in Morrow County on these charges, eight have pled guilty, one was dismissed and one is still pending. Of the three persons arrested in Umatilla city, all three have pled guilty, concluded the sheriff.

10 Years Ago
Maggie Reynolds and Mary Bailey, at 88 perhaps Oregon's oldest twins celebrated their birthdays in Heppner February 5. Mrs. Bailey was a Heppner resident.

Bob Adelman of the Soil Conservation Service told the Chamber of Commerce that the first phase of a land stabilization and sediment control project covering 106 square acres would begin. The initial phase consisted of 324,000 square feet of diversion ditches, and 89 erosion control dams. It covered areas of 36 square miles and included 16 land-owners.

25 Years Ago
"Large quantities of ground water can be developed at places in the Boardman bombing range by the use of wells," Bruce Foxworthy geologist with the U.S. Geological Survey at Portland told the Morrow County water resources committee Tuesday. Foxworthy said that a survey had been made of parts of the Bombing Range for the Navy.

The most extensive gopher poisoning campaign ever put on in this county has just been completed through the cooperation with the Soil Conservation Service and the U.S.D.A. Extension Service. Probably no county in Oregon has come so close to poisoning 100 percent of its creek bottom land, and certainly no county has ever done so much poisoning at a lower cost.

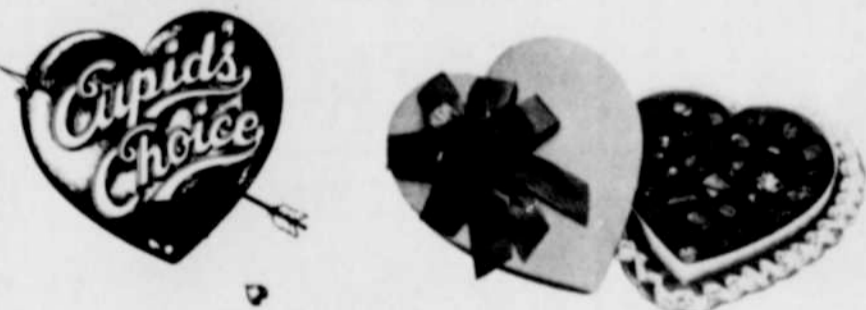

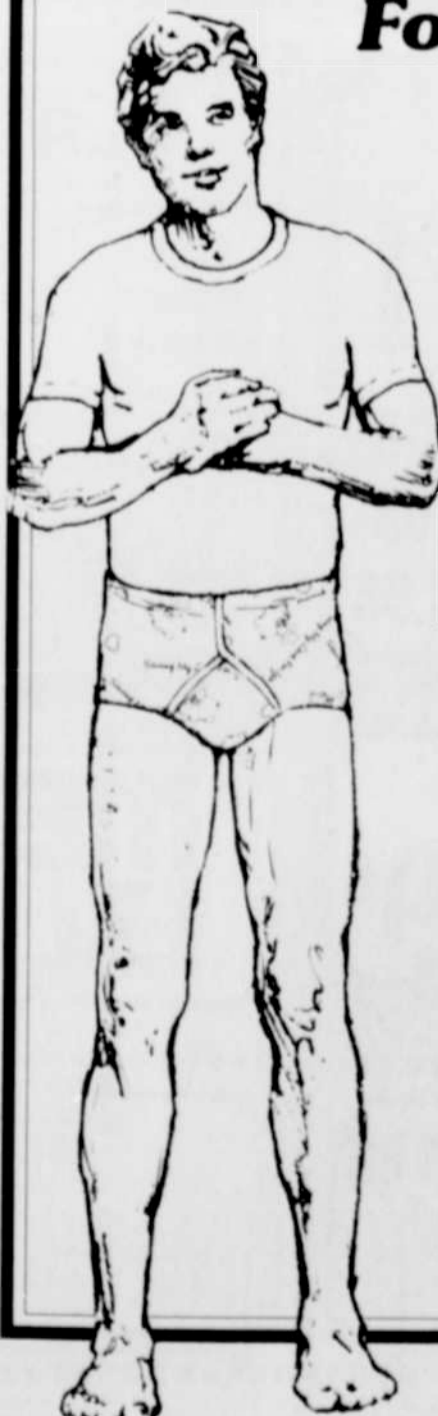
