Consumer publications offered

On occasion, the Consumer Information Center likes to offer short releases on a variety of booklets available from Pueblo, Colorado. Here are three on booklets published by the U.S. General Services Administration that describe useful government programs and services.

Federal Information Centers
You want to notify a federal agency about an unsafe product. But do you call the Consumer Product Safety Commission, the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration, the Food and Drug Administration, the Occupational Safety and Health Administration, or some other agency?

Call your local federal information center, which is part of the U.S. General Services Administration. With a local call, you can reach a Federal Information Center in more than 70 cities around the United States. Staff members will help you figure out which agency you should contact, and they can also give you addresses and telephone numbers for the offices to call. To find the Federal Information Center nearest you, send for a free copy of the pamphlet, "Federal Information Centers." Just send your name and address to the Consumer Information Center, Dept. 591P, Pueblo, Colorado 81009.

Your Right to Federal Records
In most cases, you can get information from the federal government simply by writing to the right agency. But sometimes the agencies are not willing to give out the information you need. In that case, you must make your request under the Freedom of Information Act. This law allows you access to most agency records, with certain exceptions. And another law, the Privacy Act, allows you to learn what the government has on file about you.

You can learn how to use these acts to your benefit by sending for a copy of the booklet, "Your Right to Federal Records." Published by the U.S. General Services Administration in cooperation with the Department of Justice, "Your Right to Federal Records" provides questions and answers about how to use each act, and describes the exceptions where information does not have to be released. It also includes the text of the Freedom of Information Act. For your copy of "Your Right to Federal Records," send 50 cents to the Consumer Information Center, Dept. 452P, Pueblo, CO 81009.

Get some bright ideas on how to save, fix your car, quit smoking, choose life insurance, select a home computer, cut food bills, apply for credit, write a resume, get federal benefits, buy surplus land, reduce cholesterol, spot a con job, save energy, start a business, pay for an education. The last is the brightest of all. It tells you about the others. Published quarterly by the Consumer Information Center of the U.S. General Services Administration, the "Consumer Catalog" lists more than 200 federal booklets on everything from starting a diet to starting school, from getting a job to getting fit, from repairing a house to repairing a credit rating. Legion invites students to enter

High school students of Heppner have been invited by the Heppner American Legion Post No. 87 to compete in the Annual National High School Oratorical Contest. The invitation to enter the competition was extended today by Post Oratorical Chairman Arnie Hedman. The contest for Heppner students has been arranged with the full cooperation of local school officials and Roger Records of the Heppner High School faculty who will assist with the contest arrangements.

The subject in the prepared oration portion of the contest must be about some phase of the Constitution of the United States, emphasizing the duties and obligations of a citizen to the United States Government. The prepared oration must be the original effort of each contestant and must be 8-10 minutes in length. In addition to the awards by winners of the various elimination rounds of competition, university scholarships of \$10,000, \$14,000, \$10,000 and \$8,000 will be awarded to the first through fourth places in the national finals. Each state winner who competes in the regional contest will receive a \$1,000 scholarship. Participants in each of four sectional contests who do not advance to the national finals will receive an additional \$1,000 scholarship. The top four youthful orators who have won all previous elimination rounds of the contest will vie for top honors in the 1986 National Finals.

The contest will be held Tuesday, February 18 at 8 p.m. at the Heppner High School cafeteria. The public is invited to attend.

The evening's program was on "Birdscaping" by Theta Lowe, who had interesting pictures, facts and anecdotes about birds of this vicinity.

In March, instead of having the usual first Monday meeting in the evening, it is planned that the club will meet at the home of Jerry and Martha Doherty at 2 p.m. on March 3, for a discussion and demonstration of pruning techniques by County Extension Agent Fred Lundin.

Farmers may qualify for emergency loans

The Secretary of Agriculture has declared several counties in Washington as natural disaster areas due to losses by farmers from drought which occurred from January 1, 1985 through October 31, 1985. In accordance with Public Law 98-258, counties in an adjacent state that are contiguous to one or more of the designated areas are also made eligible for Emergency Loan Assistance from the Farmers Home Administration. Thus, farmers in Gilliam, Hood River, Morrow, Sherman, Umatilla, Wallowa and Wasco Counties of Oregon may also qualify. Applications for Emergency Loans will be accepted through September 22, 1986 under this designation at the Farmers Home Administration office serving Umatilla, Morrow and Gilliam Counties, located at 1229 S.E. Third, Pendleton, Oregon 97801. To qualify for production loss loans, the operation must be a family size farm and have sustained at least a 30 percent production loss in a basic enterprise of the farm. Farmers must be unable to obtain needed credit elsewhere, also.

Veterans slate public hearing at BMCC

The Department of Veterans Affairs will hold a public hearing to consider adoption of a proposed amendment to Administrative Rule 274-20-341 which now fixes the variable interest rates to be paid by veterans. The hearing will be held on Thursday, March 13, 1986, at 7:00-10:00 p.m., in the Pioneer Hall Theater of the Blue Mountain Community College, 2411 Northwest Cariden Avenue, Pendleton, Oregon. The proposed amendment would: (a) Increase the payment amount of all loans closed between February 29, 1980 and October 15, 1982, to compensate for the one percent interest rate increase effective January 1, 1986; (b) Allow holders of loans issued on or before February 29, 1980, the option of an increase in the payment amount or an extension in the length of the loan to pay the higher interest rate; (c) Provide for a hearing where the loan holder claims a contract right based on a DVA brochure, not to have the interest rate increase cause a payment increase.

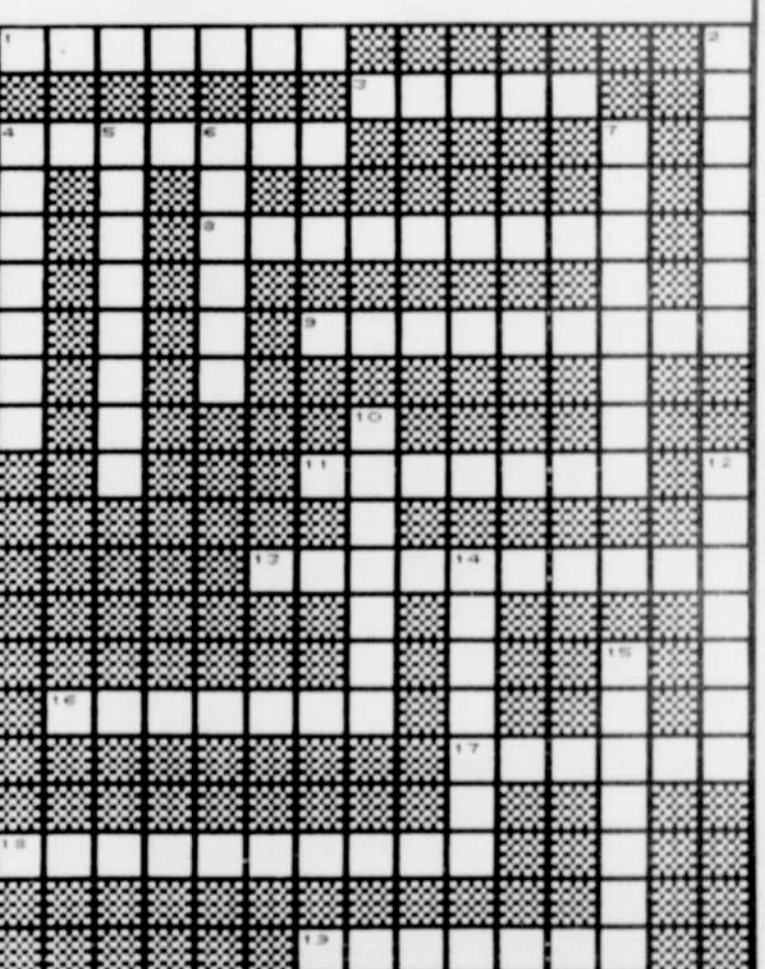
