

Fillies try harder for 40-30 win over No. 1 ranked Crow

Crow, the top-ranked team in the state in the final Class "A" poll, and Heppner, ranked second, battled to a standstill in the first half and the Fillies earned a berth in the championship game by dominating the Cougars in the second half.

Crow led throughout the first frame and was up 8-7 at the end of the frame. Poor Heppner shooting plus Crow turnovers, kept the score at a relatively low amount, while Crow's Michele Edwards dominated the backboards early.

Missy Eubanks, Dana Reid, and Missy Turner forced the Cougars to turn the ball over with Heppner's swarming full-court pressure often in the second period. But poor shooting by the Fillies kept Crow in the game.

For the game the Fillies made 16

of 60 field goals for just 27 percent, but that rate was considerably higher in the second half. "I think we were just nervous in the first half," explained Turner. "We started to relax in the second half and the shots went in."

The game continued at a nip and tuck pace in the second period, but Turner gave Heppner the momentum going into intermission when she tied the game 17-17 with two seconds left in the period.

The Fillies' 5'11" center, Penny Connor, picked up three fouls in the first half, but made Edwards sit down in the third quarter when she got her third foul.

From there Turner scored off a pass from Lanna Reid at the 2:51 mark. Almost a minute later Turner scored off a Dana Reid feed and then

Eubanks scored from the free throw line off a pass from Lana Reid and Heppner led 27-22 at the end of three quarters.

Connor picked up her fourth foul with 1:29 left in the third quarter, but Theresa Lindsay, with help from Eubanks in the fourth period, helped to control Edwards.

After Edwards hit a basket to pull the Cougars within 29-24, Dana Reid hit a shot and Eubanks canned two free throws to put the Fillies ahead 33-24.

At the 2:18 mark Dana Reid fouled out, but Andrea Ball, who forced the overtime session the afternoon before with Amity, came in.

Ball drilled two free throws at the 1:29 mark to push Heppner to a 36-26 lead and then came back 26 seconds later to claim an offensive rebound,

which she turned into a three point play as Heppner had the game clinched.

"We took control in the third quarter and dominated them (Crow) in every aspect of the game in the second half," said Heppner coach Mike Royer. "We were quicker than they were and more aggressive. We stuck with our 1-3-1 zone defense and Penny Connor and Theresa Lindsay did a good job on Edwards."

"The shots wouldn't drop for us in the first half," said Royer, "but we just continued running our man-to-man offense and didn't force things."

"Our girls earned it (the right to be in the state championship game)," added Royer. "They go hard for four quarters and deserve to be state champs."
