The efforts to Beef-Up Beef Consumption are supported by Anchor, a division of Boehringer Ingelheim Animal Health pharmaceutical company. Garden club learns about helpful insects

"Garden Helpers" was the subject at the Lone Garden Club meeting on Wednesday, Feb. 12 at the home of Ruth McCabe.

There were many animals and insects which can help the gardener, said presenter Delta Huber. These include toads and reptiles that kill harmful insects, earth worms that break down the soil so that its nutrients can be used by the plants, spiders that destroy grasshoppers and other bugs that are the enemy of the gardener. One can buy insects to solve specific problems. Some that might be purchased are the lady bug, lacewings, trichogramma, syrphid fly and praying mantis. In some cases these are more satisfactory than sparys because because they can work on the under side of the leaves. In most cases it is best to release these at about two week intervals because that is the usual cycle for harmful insects.

Pat Pettyjohn, district chairman for junior essays, posters and poems, reported that there were 110 posters for the Woodsy Owl and Smokey the Bear contest from the lone and Olex elementary school. Thirty winning posters were sent to the Oregon Federation of Garden Clubs office to be entered in the state contest.

Leila Palmer, therapy chairman, announced that the club would entertain at the Pioneer Memorial Nursing Home on March 17.

During the business meeting Lorraine Ladd reported that the club had made recommendations concerning planters for Main Street beautification and that we will cooperate with clean-up day on March 21.

The annual plant sale is planned for April 30 at the Legion Hall.
