Boys outshine girls for first time since 1980

For the first time since 1980 a Heppner boys' track team outshone a girls track team with a second place finish in a triangular meet with Elgin and Class "AA" Mac-Hi on Tuesday, April 1.

Heppner's boys' team finished with 53 1/2 points to finish behind Elgin (69 1/2 points) and ahead of Mac-Hi (49 1/2 points).

Girls team scores were Elgin 88, Mac-Hi 37, and Heppner 25.

Bryan Padberg paced the boys team by coming from behind to win the 800 meters in 2:12.6 and set a freshman class record in the 1500 meters with a time of 4:30.6, also for first place.

Jason Palmer heaved the discus 139'2" for first and established a personal best by over 10 feet. Palmer also shot putted 36'5/4" for fourth place.

Chris McLaughlin won the 110 meter high hurdles in :19.2 and placed second in the 300 meter intermediate hurdles with a time of :47.7.

High jumpers Scott Buschke and Wayne Wilgers each leaped 6'0" to tie for first and third respectively. Buschke earned the top spot because he had fewer misses at 6'0".

Ashely Conklin earned second in both the long jump (18'5") and the triple jump (38'3") also a personal best. He was also on the second place 1600 meter relay team of Marty Brannon, Scott Jones, and Jim Brosnan that ran 4:30.8.

Brosnan ran the 400 meter dash in :58.7 for second and Brannon tossed the javelin 125'1" for second. Brosnan was also on the 400 meter relay team of Jones, Barney Lindsay, and Jason Dougherty which ran :48.3 for second place.

Dougherty dashed to times of :12.7 in the 100 meters and :25.9 in the 200 meters to finish third and fourth respectively. Jones was third in the 200 at :25.7 and also competed in the 100.

Lindsay leaped 16'7" for third in the long jump and was in the 100 and 200 meter dashes.

Sophomores Kim Sager and Cathy Martin paced the girls track team.

Sager finished second in the 100 at :14.2 and Martin was second in the 1500 at 6:04.7. The two then teamed for first in the 1600 meter relay, along with Stacey Kennedy and Nance Wright in a time of 5:02.1.

Sager and Kennedy joined Kim Wright and Dorothy Hays to garner third in the sprint relay with a time of :57.8.

Kennedy added second in the 400 running 1:12.6, while Nance Wright grabbed second place with an 800 time of 3:29.2.

Hays finished third and Kim Wright fourth in the high hurdles with clockings of :22.1 and :23.1 respectively. Hays also competed in the 200 meters.

Jill Conklin turned in a third in the long jump going 13' 1 1/2 and a fourth in the high jump clearing 4'2".

In the distance races Michelle Beck ran second in the 3000 meters with a time of 14:33 and Missy Gates ran the 1500 in 7:35 for fourth.

Also competing were Kim Bond and Shannon McLaughlin in both the shot put and discus.

"We were pleased with the overall performances of everybody," said head coach Dale Conklin. Heppner's thincads competed in a fourway meet with Lone, Riverside, and Umatilla. However, results were not available by press time.

On Saturday, April 12, Heppner along with Lone and Riverside will host the 18th annual Morrow County Invitational in Umatilla. Field events will start at 11 a.m. and running events at 12:30 p.m. The meet, considered the premier meet of Eastern Oregon will draw 26 schools from Districts 7 and 8. Enterprise the defending champion returns senior Shane Campbell who is the defending state champion in the 100 and 200 meter dashes and the runner-up in the 400 meters. Campbell will be pushed by Helix senior Tim Porter who was the state runner-up in the 100.

Porter is also the state champ in the long jump and runner-up in the high jump. Also expected to do well

in the meet will be Wahtonka's John Schacher and Tom Clymore in the high jump.

Boys' teams contending for the title will be Enterprise, Helix, Union, Umatilla, and Wahtonka. Girls teams in the running are Pine Eagle, Pilot Rock, Sherman County, and Weston McEwen.

Among the key events in the girls competition will be the high jump, 100 meters, both relays, and the distance events.

"It will be an excellent field to compete against," said Conklin. "In a meet of this magnitude it will be hard to even earn a place. This (the meet) will probably be the toughest competition of any meet all year, except the state meet."

Mustangs split doubleheader with Stanfield

Heppner's baseball team earned a split in a doubleheader against the Stanfield Tigers on Saturday, April 5. The Mustangs got shutout 10-0 in the opening game, but came back with a dramatic 12-11 victory in nine innings in the nightcap.

"It was a perfect day for baseball," said Heppner coach Mike Royer. "It was sunny, the temperature was in the 60's, and there wasn't a cloud in the sky."

The Tigers were near perfection in the first game as was their ace, senior Howard Wagoner.

The 6'0" righthander struck out 14 Mustangs in only six innings. Wagoner gave up only a fourth inning double to Bob Riehl and a fifth inning triple to Joe Taylor as he faced only three batters over the minimum.

Stanfield got two hits, three runs, and three RBIs from Wagoner and four RBIs and two hits from Scott Wells.

Loran Hayes who went the distance for the Mustangs, gave up only three runs and four hits after the second inning. "They hit he ball well and got a strong performance from Wagoner, while we struggled," said Royer. "After the first two innings, Loran settled down and pitched well. His pitching is going to help us out down the road. It's just a matter of time."

In the second game, the Mustangs opened the game with two runs on a single by Troy Hyatt and a walk to Loran Hayes, plus two passed balls and an error.

In the bottom of the first, Stanfield countered with two runs of its own. The Tigers added four more runs in the third inning on a single, double, and two passed balls, plus a hit batsmen.

Joe Taylor hit a double in the fourth inning and scored after a passed ball and a double by Rob Poorman to pull Heppner within 6-3. With a pair of doubles and an error

in the bottom of the fourth inning, Stanfield added three runs to enjoy a 9-3 advantage. The Mustangs came alive with four runs in the fifth inning. Hayes led off with a single and after Bob Riehl reached on an error, Dave Pedro ripped an RBI single to score Hayes.

Taylor followed with a walk and Dick Devin cracked a single up the middle to bring home Riehl. Mark Fishburn grounded into a double play, but Taylor and Devin scored when John Kenny reached on an error.

With a single and two errors the Tigers added two runs in the bottom of the fifth to lead 11-7.

After walks to Fishburn and Kenny in the seventh, Poorman got hit by a pitch to load the bases. Angell reached on an error to score
