A 41-hour train trip took them across the Nullarbor Plain where they saw kangaroos and emus running wild. They enjoyed a bus trip through Perth, the next stop. Seven miles away at Fremantle time trials were being conducted for the big yachting race which the Australia II won last year. Australia II and Australia III and Cookaburra I and II were trying out for the next race. A bus trip up the west coast to Geraldton, a fishing-type village with mining and fishing the main industries and where they had the opportunity to swim and play in the Indian Ocean. At Kalbarri they toured the Murchison River Gorge and enjoyed the ocean again. The beaches were much like ours. Back in Perth, they flew to Sydney for three days. Mrs. Schwarzin visited the famous opera house twice, once for a performance of the Australian Symphony Orchestra and once for the ballet "Don Quixote."
