Garden club sets spring plant sale

The annual spring Plant Sale will be April 30 at the Lone Legion Hall. Plans for the sale were completed at an April 9 meeting at the home of Pat Pettyjohn. The sale will start at 10 a.m. and close at 3:30 p.m.

"Geraniums" was the subject for the day presented by Pat Pettyjohn. Pelargoniums more commonly known as geraniums, she said, are a very "social" plant and will grow most any place. There are six classes including the scented, zonales, fancy leafed, ivy leafed, royal and species. Geraniums do not need a dormant stage. To have healthy plants they need sun, coolness, humidity, water, tight pots, space to develop and fresh atmosphere. Plants should not be hung upside down over the winter as often surmised.

During the business meeting Pat Pettyjohn reported that she had received 13 posters and 10 essays for the Junior Conservation Contest on

the subject "My Favorite Flower Growing in Oregon" from the fifth grade of the Lone Elementary School. These will be judged and winners sent on to the state contest.
