Tri-County Home Health Agency, in cooperation with the Heppner Neighborhood Center, is presenting a foot care clinic at the Neighborhood Center May 6.

Those wishing this service should contact the Home Health Agency of office and schedule a time for their foot care. A fee of \$5 will be charged each client.

Feet will first be soaked in a warm water bath. A Registered Nurse will inspect the client's feet and trim the toenails. Information on routine foot

care will be available. Foot or toenail problems will be referred to a client's personal physician or to a podiatrist.

Those with diabetes or circulatory impairment need written permission from their physicians for the nurse to trim their toenails.

Further information can be obtained by calling the Home Health of office at 676-5133. If public response is positive future clinics will be planned, said an agency spokesperson.

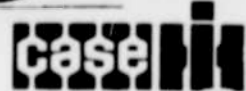
