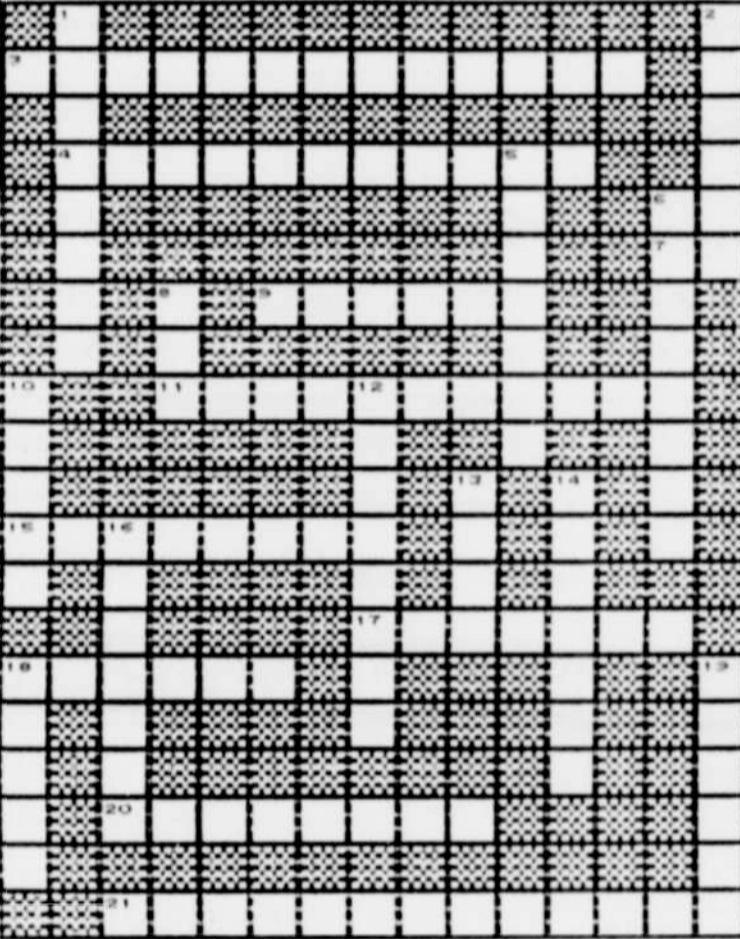

Pioneer Memorial Hospital, Heppner, Oregon provides this notice of the availability of uncompensated services in accordance with regulations promulgated by the Secretary of Health and Human Services, set forth in 42 CFR, Part 124.

Federal law requires that Pioneer Memorial Hospital provide a reasonable amount of care without charge to people who cannot afford care.

Accordingly, from July 1, 1986 until June 30, 1987, Pioneer Memorial Hospital will provide \$23,850.00 of uncompensated care to individuals meeting the eligibility criteria.

Services that are eligible include inpatient acute care at the Pioneer Memorial Hospital.

Eligibility recipients will be determined on a first come, first serve basis until the allocation is made for the year.

Criteria for determining eligibility:

Individuals will be eligible for uncompensated care on a first come first serve basis, if their annual family income is at or below the following amounts.

Funds to pay for these services have not come from the Federal government. The free care requirement by this Federal law is paid for by higher charges to other patients and/or property tax revenue.

## Tailoring instructions offered

More than 80 photographs illustrate step-by-step directions in making a tailored woman's jacket in a new publication available from the Oregon State University Extension Service.

Called "Tailoring Women's Jackets with Fusible Interfacing," EC 1218, the publication was prepared by Ardis Koester, Extension textiles and clothing specialist, and Velma Mitchell, former OSU Extension home economist in Lane County.

The 30-page publication was done in response to renewed demand for information about tailoring which reflects fashion trends and the renewed popularity of classic blazers for women. Koester explains Tailoring builds permanent shape into a garment and fusible interfacing is a time saving product which molds shape into jackets or other garments.

Koester notes that even though fashion changes more slowly in tailored than non-tailored clothing, persons considering making their

own jackets should be aware of change and select a pattern that is in fashion.

After mastering the basic tailoring techniques shown in the bulletin, "it will be easier for you to construct a variety of fashionable tailored jackets," she adds. Many of the techniques described are also applicable to coats.

The publication includes information about selecting patterns, fabric and interfacings as well as preparing fabric and interfacing for use. Construction instructions start with buying or making shoulder shapes to achieve a customized fit and end with sewing on buttons.

Copies of "Tailoring Women's Jackets with Fusible Interfacing" are available at \$2 each. The publication may be obtained through county offices of the OSU Extension Service or ordered by mail from the OSU Bulletin Clerk, OSU, Corvallis 97331.
