During their first 4-year term of missionary service, Mr. Davis and his wife Cyndi will be involved in extensive language study, evangelism and general missionary work.

In Hong Kong with a population of nearly five million, only five percent profess to be evangelical Protestants. Chinese folk religion is the religion with the largest following in Hong Kong. It is a mixture of Buddhism, Confucianism, Taoism, polytheism and ancient ancestor veneration.

Prior to missionary appointment, Mr. Davis worked at Christian Center in Salem, as an associate and administrator at the Christian Center Academy. A graduate of Oregon College of Education, Monmouth, Oregon, with the B.S. in Education and Psychological Studies, Mr. Davis completed the M.S. in Education Administration from the University of Oregon in Eugene.

## Local man named Sailor of the Year

At 1 Ladd E. Dick has been named Cougar sailor of the year for 1985 according to a news item in the Oak Harbor, Washington, news. "Dick was recognized for his superior performance while serving TAD as supervisor of workcenter 64B at AIMD," says the item. "His expertise, innovative approach to leadership and managerial ability were instrumental in his selection and were solely responsible for the quality electronic systems support received by the Cougars during the past year."

Dick is the son of Ed and Rachel Dick of Heppner. He graduated from Heppner High School and worked in the area for several years before enlisting in the Navy at age 30.

Joining the U.S. Navy on May 28, 1974, he attended recruit training at NTC San Diego, and then completed aviation fundamentals, BE&E, AV'A' and AFTA schools at NTTC Memphis. He received a letter of recognition for completing the 26-week AFTA school in 20 weeks. Subsequent duty stations included VR-21 at Barbers Point, Hawaii, VAQ-135 at NAS Whidbey Island, and NAMTraGruDet at NAS Whidbey Island.

While attached to VAQ-135, Dick made deployments on board USS Nimble and USS Kitty Hawk to the Western Pacific and Indian oceans, and Mediterranean Sea. He received the Navy Expeditionary Medal, his first good conduct medal, Battle "E" Ribbon, Meritorious Unit Commendation, and two Sea Service Deployment awards.

While with NAMTraGruDet, Dick received a letter of appreciation from Raytheon Corporation for his assistance in the complete rewrite of three intermediate level maintenance technical publications. His talent as an instructor and dedication

resulted in his designation as a master training specialist.

Dick's experience was exactly what the Cougars were looking for, says the news item. He has quickly earned a reputation as "Mr. ALQ-99," the expert on the EA-6B tactical jamming system. Demonstrating exemplary personal initiative, exceptional attention to detail, uncommon foresight and a firm grasp of organization and priorities, he excelled as supervisor of workcenter 64B on USS Constellation. During inaugural deployment in 1985, Dick was responsible for the entire EA-6B mobile facility complex.

His expertise and experience on the nine avionics test benches installed in the "van" were responsible for remarkable RFI and air wing readiness rates. As a result of his effective workcenter administration, 64B received grades of "outstanding" for both the ComFAirWestPac middeployment and ComASWingPac post-deployment inspections, and had zero discrepancies for three quarterly workcenter quality assurance audits.

For his consistently superior performance, Dick was nominated for the Navy Achievement Medal by IM3 division, USS Constellation and selected as the VAQ-139 intermediate level maintenance Powler of the year. The top supervisor in the av-arm division, Dick has been instrumental in coordinating turnaround and replacement training since return.

His close liaison with the squadron during this period contributed to the smooth and timely flow of valuable information which has maintained the high morale and readiness of the AIMD personnel. Dick has earned his second good conduct medal and his third Sea Service Deployment Ribbon.
