

9 local students to attend state writing conference

Morrow County School District is sending nine students to the Second Annual Oregon Writing Festival on Saturday, May 10 at the University of Oregon in Eugene.

Students from grades 1-12 were selected locally for their outstanding writing ability. Each has prepared a special work to share with other students and writing instructors at the Festival.

The Morrow County School District students who will join over 800 students from 130 school districts throughout the state are: Theresa Lindsay, Heppner High School; Kim Stookey, Heppner Junior High; Nicole Duncan, Heppner Elementary; Jennifer Richardson, Riverside High; Bill Byrd, Columbia Junior High; Jeff Legore, A.C. Houghton Elementary; Jana Mounts, Sam Boardman Elementary; David Wagenblast, Lone Elementary; and Jim Davison, Lone Junior High.

Chaperones will be Dave Ball from A.C. Houghton and Linda Dutcher from Heppner High.

In addition to sharing their own works, students will attend a special presentation by one of four featured speakers:

Elaine McGraw, author of 17 books for young people; Kim Stafford, a published poet and director of the Oregon Writing Project at Lewis and Clark College; Dr. Eric

Kimmel, author of six children's books and Professor of Education at Portland State College; and Katherine Dunn, a columnist for Willamette Week, who has published two novels and a variety of other writing.

Students and teachers will also participate in workshops conducted by professional writers and outstanding teachers from across the state.

The Oregon Writing Festival, which is cosponsored by the Oregon Council of Teachers of English, the Oregon State Department of Education and the University of Oregon, is organized to recognize and encourage Oregon students and teachers for their efforts to improve writing.

A recent Beef Trivia Promotion was introduced by the Beef for Father's Day National Chairman, Lucille, Schuer of South Dakota. She suggests that the CowBelles use a local radio or place in the newspapers the Beef Trivia Questions and answers to call attention to our great product. Listed below are some of the Beef Trivia Promotion questions and answers:

1. Where did the hamburger originate? Russia-The hamburger is a descendant of steak tartare, eaten by Tartary's nomadic horsemen throughout the area known today as Russia.

2. How many pounds of T-bone steak do we get from the average beef carcass? 10 pounds-which, along with the preference for a good steak, explains why T-bone steak costs more than chuck roast. (Each carcass has more than 100 lbs. of chuck roast).

11. How did "sirloin steak" get its name? The British are credited with the origin of the world sirloin. Legend has it that a British monarch

was so impressed with the steak he was eating, he drew his sword and dubbed the steak "sirloin."

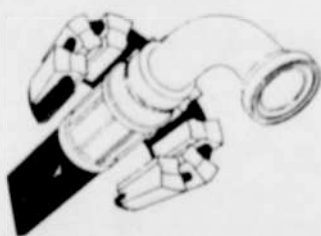
