MEASURE NO. 4

Requires special election for U.S. Senator vacancy, removes constitutional provision

QUESTION: Shall special election fill United States Senator vacancy, constitutional provision allowing appointment by Governor until next general election be deleted?

EXPLANATION: Amends Oregon Constitution. The constitution now requires any United States Senator vacancy to be filled at the next general election, and allows the Governor to appoint a Senator to fill the vacancy until that time. This measure removes that provision. Under a statute which will take effect if the measure passes, a vacancy in the office of United States Senator must be filled by special election.

ESTIMATE OF FINANCIAL EFFECT: A special election, based on 1986 costs, would cost about \$600,000, if held at a time other than a primary or general election.

MEASURE NO. 5

Constitutional amendment: \$96 million bonds for state-county prison buildings

QUESTION: Shall the constitution allow \$96 million state bond debt and additional county debts to establish joint state-county prisons?

EXPLANATION: Constitutional amendment. Authorizes a \$96 million state general obligation bond debt to establish a fund to finance joint state-county prisons. Also allows counties to incur debts for the same purpose. Laws may be passed to govern the way in which the amendment will be carried out by the state and counties. State bonds will be paid from funds appropriated by the legislature or by property taxes. Refunding of state bonds allowed.

ESTIMATE OF FINANCIAL EFFECT: This proposed amendment authorizes the issuance of general obligation bonds in the amount not to exceed \$96 million for the purpose of creating a building fund for state and county prison buildings. The \$96 million, and interest for these bonds, will be repaid from the state general fund.

COUNTY MEASURE NO. 6

Tax levy outside the tax base

QUESTION: Shall Morrow County levy \$2,469,040 outside the tax base for operating purposes during fiscal year 1986-87?

EXPLANATION: The purpose of this levy is to provide funds to balance the Morrow County operating budget which includes: General Fund, Road Fund, County School Fund, Cities portion of Road Funds, Fair and Roden Fund, plus the North Morrow Ambulance and North Morrow Medical Clinic Funds for 1986-87. The tax base for 1986-87 is \$522,000. The total levy will be \$3,400,877, which includes six percent for taxes not expected to be received and also includes \$28,143 for Lifeguard Medical Training and \$381,894 for Pioneer Memorial Hospital debt previously approved by the voters. The tax rate for County operations excluding the Hospital is .48 per \$1,000 valuation, and Lifeguard 1.04 per \$1,000 valuation. The estimated tax cost for this measure is an ESTIMATE ONLY based on the best information available from the County Assessor at the time of estimate.

MEASURE NO. 7

Morrow County School District

QUESTION: Shall the District levy \$6,180,808 outside its Tax Base and increase its net tax rate to permit raising requested dollars?

EXPLANATION: The district has authority to levy the tax base of \$834,809. This sum, plus non-tax revenues, is inadequate to operate the schools for one year. If this measure is approved, \$6,180,808 more than the tax base amount will be levied to operate the schools. \$5,934,239 of this combined amount is eligible for partial state funding. \$1,081,378 will be funded by county taxpayers without any partial state payment.

The total general fund levy will result in an estimated tax rate of \$8.77 per \$1,000.00 of assessed valuation, before offsets. Approval of this measure authorizes levying both the total dollars in question plus increasing the tax rate necessary to raise the dollars.

The estimated tax cost of this measure is an ESTIMATE ONLY based on the best information available from the County Assessor at the time of estimate. (ORS 310-195)

MEASURE NO. 8

Establishing a Soil and Water Conservation District Tax Base

QUESTION: Shall Morrow County Soil and Water Conservation District become a taxing district and establish \$93,000 tax base effective fiscal year 1987-88?

EXPLANATION: Tax base will provide technical services to help control and eradicate noxious weeds, provide range inventory and management assistance, control and prevent and erosion, develop water resources, control flooding, improve water quality, improve fish and wildlife habitat, increase timber production, build diversion ditches, grassed waterways and install tile drainage and develop recreation.

Tax base will help the district maintain education and soils information programs. It will enable the district to obtain matching funds and apply for projects and grant monies.

Approval of the base would result in maximum estimated rate of \$ 12-\$1,000 assessed value. Estimated cost is \$7.20 for property assessed at \$60,000. The estimated tax cost for this tax base is an ESTIMATE ONLY based on the best information available from the County Assessor at the time of estimate.

MEASURE NO. 1

Constitutional amendment: Bans income tax on social security benefits

QUESTION: Shall the Oregon Constitution ban state or local income tax on social security or railroad retirement benefits?

EXPLANATION: Constitutional amendment. This amendment bans counting social security or railroad retirement benefits as income under any state or local tax law. The measure is not intended to affect any benefits which a person would otherwise have a right to receive. It applies to the tax period beginning on or after January 1, 1986.

MEASURE NO. 2

Constitutional amendment: Effect of merger of taxing units on tax base

QUESTION: Shall district tax base, after merger not increasing its territory, equal tax bases former districts would have had without merger?

EXPLANATION: Constitutional amendment. Adds a provision to the section limiting tax levying authority of taxing units. If a taxing unit merges with one or more other taxing units without increasing its territory, its first year tax base will equal the combined tax bases of all the merged taxing units for the last tax year, plus six percent. This is equal to the combined tax bases the taxing units would have had if they had not merged.

MEASURE NO. 3

Constitutional amendment: Verification of signatures on initiative and referendum petitions

QUESTION: Shall constitution direct the legislature to establish the method for Secretary of State verification of initiative and referendum petition signatures?

EXPLANATION: Constitutional amendment. Requires legislature to adopt law stating the way the Secretary of State shall verify signatures on initiative and referendum petitions. The verification process must be completed within 15 days after the last day on which a petition may be filed. Removes present provision that signatures not verified within 15 days shall not be counted.
