

Thinclads finish second

Unable to shake the depth of the Wahtonka boys track team for the second week in a row, Heppner's boys track team finished second behind the Eagles with 86 points at the Columbia Basin Conference track and field meet on Saturday, May 10. A week earlier at the Condon Invitational, Heppner finished second behind Wahtonka as well.

Pilot Rock and Stanfield tied for the girls top spot, each finishing with 89 points. The Heppner girls team placed ninth out of the nine team field with 10 points.

The only first place finish for a Heppner thinclad was by sophomore Jason Doherty, who won the 300 intermediate hurdles with a time of 42.5. Dougherty bettered the Heppner High School sophomore class record of 44.1 set by Bryce Powell in 1977.

Dougherty was also sixth in the 100 meter dash with a time of 12.1 and was on the 400 and 1600 meter relay teams that finished fourth in both.

The sprint relay team of Chris McLaughlin, Barney Lindsay, Wayne Wilgers, and Dougherty ran 48.9. The long relay team of McLaughlin, Dougherty, Lindsay, and Bryan Padberg ran a season's best time of 3:53.6.

Padberg also fared well in the 800 meter run, in which he finished second with a time of 2:02.7 lowering his previous HHS freshmen class record from 2:05.5. He also competed in the high jump.

McLaughlin, competing in both hurdle events, had personal bests in both. He ran the 110 meter highs in 17.3 and the intermediates in 44.3, placing third in both.

Wilgers was second in the high jump (6'3"), third in the triple jump (37'10 1/2") and sixth in the long jump (18'11 1/2").

Jason Palmer earned a pair of seconds in the shot put and discus. He put the shot a personal best 40'0 1/2" and threw the disc 128'2".

Ashley Conklin leaped to a second place in the triple jump with a mark of 39'10" and to a third place in the long jump with a mark of 19'1".

Lindsay rounded out the boys scoring with a time of 25.0 in the 200, good for fifth place. He also long jumped 17'4 1/2".

"All of the boys competed really well," head coach Dale Conklin said. "We got good efforts from everybody and they all placed."

Leading the girls team were Cathy Martin and Kim Sager.

Martin placed third in the 1500 meter run with a season's best time of 5:34.4. She also joined Sager on the 1600 meter relay team of Stacey Kennedy and Jill Conklin that ran 4:48.6, a season's best, but did not place. Sager sprinted the 400 meter course in 1:06.6 for fifth place and a personal best.

Kennedy, Conklin, Dorothy Hays, and Sager joined to run the sprint relay in 58.2 and grab sixth place. Also grabbing sixth place was Michelle Beck, who ran the 1500 in a time of 5:48.9 for a personal best as well.

The Heppner thinclads now will compete in the District 7 track and field meet at Umatilla on Friday, May 16 and Saturday, May 17.

Competition will begin at 3 p.m. on Friday with preliminaries and finals in the boys high jump, triple jump, pole vault, and discus. Prelims and finals will be held in the girls shot put and javelin. Running event prelims will be held in races of 800 meters or less and in both hurdle events.

Competition on Saturday will start at noon, with prelims and finals in the boys long jump, shot put, and javelin. Girls field events on Saturday will include the high jump, long jump, and discus. All running event finals will be held on Saturday.

Those who place first or second at the district meet, plus those meeting state qualifying standards, will be eligible to compete in the Class "A" state meet a week later in Springfield.

Favorites to win the boys title include Helix, Heppner, and Wahtonka. Contending for the top girls spot will be Echo, Pilot Rock, Stanfield, and Weston-McEwen. Trophies will be given to the top two teams in both categories.

"We should be in the top three in the boys race," Conklin said. "Our chances of coming home with a trophy depend on who gets the breaks and how our people come through."

"We should be able to send several boys to the state meet, but once again it all depends on who does what," he said. "As far as the girls are concerned, Cathy Martin (in the 1500 and 300) is the best bet to advance to state."

Final team scores for the boys teams were: Wahtonka, 121; Heppner, 86; Wasco County, 75; Riverside, 72; Stanfield, 50; Umatilla and Weston-McEwen 46; Sherman County, 23; and Pilot Rock 2.

Girls team scores were: Pilot Rock and Stanfield, 89; Weston McEwen, 77; Wasco County 59; Sherman County, 46; Riverside, 40; Wahtonka, 39; Umatilla, 14; and Heppner, 10.

Mustangs sport 6-10 record overall

After splitting a doubleheader with the Umatilla Vikings on Saturday, May 10, Heppner's baseball team now sports a 6-10 record in both the Columbia Basin Conference Eastern Division and overall.

The Mustangs ended a six-game losing streak by winning the opener 9-8. Umatilla then came back to take the second game 8-5.

In the opener the Mustangs used four runs in the bottom of the seventh inning to pull out a dramatic 9-8 victory.

Umatilla's Steve Pankey struck out 11 Heppner batters in the second game and benefited from nine Heppner errors to post an 8-5 win.

Profiting from a Rod Tarter home run and five Mustang errors, the Vikings led 6-3 after three innings, in the opener, despite David Pedro's second home run of the season in the third inning for Heppner.

After the Vikings added two more runs in the top of the sixth, Heppner struck back in the bottom of the sixth.

After Pedro and Bob Riehl walked, and three Umatilla errors, Troy Hyatt punched a single scoring both Pedro and Riehl to make the score 8-5.

After Hyatt slammed the door on the Vikings in the top of the seventh, the Mustangs came roaring back.

Scott Davis walked to lead off the inning, but was lifted as Rob Poorman came in as a pinch runner.

Loran Hayes then walked, as the Mustangs had runners at first and second. John Kenny then ripped an RBI double to score both Poorman and Hayes to make the score 8-7.

Riehl, and Hyatt then walked to load the bases. Kenny came home on a wild pitch by relief pitcher Jerry Leicht to make the score 8-8.

Riehl, who took off on the wild pitch, came around to score when catcher Joel Clucas threw the ball by Leicht on Kenny's score to give the Mustangs a wild 9-8 win.

In the second game the Vikings never trailed en route to an 8-5 win.

Craig Angell went the distance for the Mustangs in the second game and despite giving up only five hits, suffered the loss as his Heppner teammates made nine errors.

Pedro, who hit a home run in the opener, came back with two hits in the nightcap. Hayes also had a good day offensively as he earned four walks and scored three runs.

Corey Wells led the Vikings in the doubleheader with four hits and five runs scored, and also stole seven bases.

Heppner played the Weston-McEwen TigerScots on Tuesday, May 13, but results were unavailable at press time. The Mustangs will end the season at home Friday against Pilot Rock, starting at 4 p.m.
