## Port makes way for canoe race

Last Wednesday's Port of Morrow commission meeting was a strong meeting with many different items covered very quickly said Bob Miller, port general manager.

A representative from Oregon Potato told the commission that the company and the Department of Environmental Quality were not satisfied with the Port's current procedure for providing samples of the effluent. DEQ had requested that the Port attach an automated sampler which would pull random samples of water from each customer from the disposal line. Since the Port bases its charges on the cleanliness of the water, the customers want an accurate breakdown of the water's constituents: grease, sand, total killed nitrogen and total suspended solids.

The Commission approved, subject to their insurance coverage, the use of a 14-acre flat site adjacent to the river known as the "Idaho Overseas Site" for overnight camping by competitors in the August 9 Greater Columbia Canoe Race. The sanctioned athletic event is expected to bring 100 10-person teams with additional support people to the Boardman area for the weekend, said Miller.

Commissioners also agreed to spend \$430 to advertise their facilities in a brochure being printed by the Boardman Enterprise which will be distributed along I-84 and at the Expo.

In additional business, the commission discussed:

-A drip irrigation system which has been purchased and installed along Ullman Blvd. to irrigate Poplar and Maple trees planted as part of a long-term landscaping project. A "traveling Big Gun" has also been approved by the DEQ and is installed and working on port property.

-The Port is working with Western Alfalfa and Circle C to move alfalfa cubes in containers to the Portland dock area more efficiently. Many of the cubes are currently being routed, at a greater cost, through Seattle because ships are not readily available at Portland. Steve Lindstrom, port marketing director also reported on talks with Simplot about shipping frozen products, fruits and vegetables through the port system.

-Matt Doherty, chairman of the Superconducting Super Collider task force reported that the committee is still involved with trying to get Boardman selected as the Oregon proposed site for the SSC. Much of the current activity, he told the commission, is "behind the scenes" but the commission will remain active until the Boardman site is selected.

-The Port adopted a policy not to act on changed policies until the meeting following their adoption so that sufficient notice of their change can be given.

-Metalurgical Services, Inc.,

which has proposed building a forge on Port property had been operating under an October deadline in compliance with a contract with a firm in Brooklyn, New York. According to the contract, they had to have the buildings finished and the plant in operation by October; however, Metalurgical Services determined that the building they would have to construct to meet that deadline would not fit with their longrange plans. They decided to wait and proceed with the project in a more orderly fashion.

-The commission learned that a May 1 DEQ inspection found no violations with the spreading of effluent and that all record-keeping was in an approved manner.

-The commission reviewed a rail track tariff and presented it to Port attorneys for review. No further action was taken.

-The commission voted to contribute \$100 to renew its membership and contribute to the efforts of the Oregon Agriculture in the Classroom task force.

-The port manager asked the commission for the authority to reconvene the airport committee to review proposals which have been submitted.

## Boeing pledges to work with Port

Agreement to participate in planning for future growth in industrial development and road and utility improvements in Morrow Co. was reached Friday, May 16 by Boeing Agri-Industrial company and Port of Morrow representatives.

Meeting in Seattle, at BAIC offices, the Boeing company pledged to work closely with the Port of Morrow, the state's designated lead agency for industrial development in Morrow County.

BAIC president W. Earl Bowden and Vice President James Crriveau discussed plans for expansion of an antenna range which in its initial development phase will cost in excess of \$10 million, adding substantially to Morrow County's tax base, if zoning is approved.

## Elks hires manager

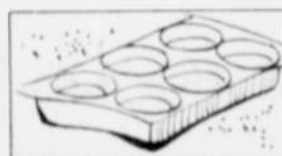
