novations in four areas—forestry, energy, water and industry. Forestry innovations must be low-cost and sustainable.

Benge is a pioneer in spreading the Leucaena, one of the world's fastest growing trees, for reforestation in developing countries.

The three men's work led to the widespread use of Leucaena to stem soil erosion, restore soil fertility, and provide fuelwood, forage, and other products. Benge has untiringly promoted the use of Leucaena since 1964 while serving in South Vietnam with the International Voluntary Services, a forerunner of the Peace Corps.

Brewbaker discovered the "giant" varieties of the leguminous tree.

Hutton developed the Cunningham variety for forage production while working with the Commonwealth Scientific Industrial Research Organization of Australia. He is now associated with the Brazilian Agricultural Research Company.

Benge began his agroforestry work with Leucaena in 1965, the year he joined AID as a rural development officer working with the Montagnards (mountain people) in South Vietnam. He introduced Leucaena as live fencing and a source of forage, fuelwood and "green manure." (Leucaena not only grows rapidly, but also can turn nitrogen from air trapped in the soil into compounds that plants can use as fertilizer, a process known as "nitrogen fixing.")

While with AID in Vietnam, Benge was given three of that government's highest awards—for public administration, public health, and work with minorities (the Montagnards).

Benge was also honored with the U.S. Secretary of State's award for heroism after rescuing 11 American civilians from enemy hands.

Benge was taken prisoner by the North Vietnamese in 1968 when he

was attempting to rescue more Americans.

After his release in 1973, Benge returned to Vietnam and continued his Leucaena work among the Montagnards.

In 1974, Benge was assigned to the AID mission in the Philippines and played a significant role in a national reforestation movement using Leucaena.

Benge grew up in Heppner, the son of Mr. and Mrs. Terrel Benge, and also lived in Hawaii for some time. He attended Oregon State University, obtaining his Masters degree in agricultural engineering in 1961. Benge received a master's degree from the University of the

Philippines at Los Banos in 1978. His thesis focused on the introduction of the Leucaena into that country.

Benge wrote the first concise technical publication "Leucaena: A Promising Forage and Tree Crop for the Tropics." He has published more than 30 articles and has written technical papers on fast growing trees and agroforestry. His writings have been translated into Spanish, French, Indonesian and Thai. Two of his articles on Leucaena won awards in 1985 from the Washington chapter of the Society for Technical Communication.

The results of Benge's work have spread to many other developing countries. One related result is a recent proposed creation of an African research network concerned with alley-cropping (alternate rows of food crops and fast-growing, nitrogen-fixing trees, leucaena or other species). Another is a major tree-planting effort in Haiti.

Since 1978, Benge has been assigned to AID headquarters in Washington, where he has concentrated on increasing forestry activities with the Agency. He helped develop major forestry programs in several countries, including Haiti, Indonesia and Guinea.
