time ever. Ammons, who was fourth in the 1500 last year, finished second in a time of 4:05.2. Erickson who burned up the track for about the first 500 meters did die out and did not place. Just over two hours later Padberg came back to run the 3000 and see what he had left after the blistering 1500. Padberg had his troubles at the start of the 3000 meter race and was in 15th place—out of the 17 man field—after the first 200 meters. "Bryan just got a terrible start," head coach Dale Conklin said. "I don't know why, but he did." Padberg again started to pass people on the straightaways and moved from ninth to fourth with 2400 meters to go. The race at this point was between Padberg, Oregon Episcopal's Eric

Utz, Crow's Andy Hillman, and Union's Brian Lowery. With five laps, or 2000 meters left, Lowery dropped back and it was a three man race. Padberg took the lead for the first time with 1400 meters to go, but Utz found little spurts on the corners to keep close, with Hillman continuing to fall back. Padberg led at the straightaways and Utz on the corners for the remainder of the race. Utz took the lead with about 200 meters to go, but Padberg took the lead with nearly 150 meters left and cruised to victory in 9:12.2, his second fastest time ever over that distance. Utz was second in 9:15.2, holding Hillman, who was third in 9:15.5. Lowery, sixth a year ago, was fourth in 9:25.3. "I didn't want to go out with Hillman, because he went out too fast," explained Padberg. "I knew if I went out and ran my own race I would be fine." "I pass people on the straightaways instead of the corners," he added, "because you run less and do less work on the straightaways, than on the corners." The pressure will be on Bryan now," said Conklin. "Winning two state titles as a freshman means he will be expected to repeat those performances every year." "We have no doubt that he can repeat as a two-time state champ," added assistant coach Brent Eggers. "If anyone could do it, he would be the one."
