

Girls golf concludes at district

Heppner's girls golf team concluded its season at the district golf tournament at Ontario on Monday, May 12 and Tuesday, May 13.

The top four individuals plus the top two teams advanced to the state tournament which was held in Portland the following week.

Bend won the two-day tournament with 749 strokes. Following in second place was Ontario with 795 total strokes.

Other team scores were Madras, 811; Crook County, 863; Burns, 881; Redmond, 941; Pendleton, 988; Heppner, 1069; and Mac-Hi, 1157.

Representing Heppner at district were junior Sofi Struthers; sophomores J.J. Osmin, Dawn

Palmer, and Sheila Piper; and freshman Benji Pearson.

Medalist for Heppner was Piper, followed by Palmer, Struthers, Osmin, and Pearson.

Medalist for the tournament was Bend's Tammy Kirk firing a 169. She shot an 89 on Monday and an 80 on Tuesday.

Following Kirk in second place was Madras' Shawna Craig with a 173. In third place was Kristi Clark of Bend with 181 total strokes was Becky Bertalotto of Ontario.

Head coach Duane Neiffer was very pleased with his team's play throughout the year.

"The girls won most of their matches during the season and showed great progress throughout," he said. "We're quite young and as we get

more experience we'll be vastly improved. These girls should really be tough in a couple of years."

Neiffer also recognized the importance of Piper and Struthers to the team.

"Sheila was our most consistent player during the course of the season and was also our best overall golfer," he said.

"Sofi was a very valuable asset to us this season," Neiffer said. "She provided some needed leadership to the younger players and really helped them on their games."

"Nancy Taylor, a freshman was also on the team this season, and while she played mostly on the junior varsity team was also a contributing factor on the varsity," Neiffer added.

Sixth place finish concludes boys golf

Heppner's boys golf team finished its season with a sixth place finish at the district golf team at Kah-Nee-Ta on Monday, May 19 and Tuesday, May 20. Heppner beat out Riverside for sixth place of the seven team field with 832 total strokes to 892 strokes for Riverside.

The top two teams plus the top four individuals earned a ticket to the state meet in Portland which was on Monday, May 26 and on Tuesday, May 27.

Madras and Mac-Hi captured the top two spots with 693 strokes and 721 strokes respectively.

Wes White of Mac-Hi was

medalist with a 158. Following him were Paul Karvoski of Enterprise (161), Miller Emerson of Madras (164), and Scott Little of Joseph (172). Karvoski was unable to attend the state tournament, so David Butch of Madras (174) went to his place.

Medalist for the Heppner boys was sophomore Dan Struthers firing a 196. Behind him was senior Keith Kenison with a 200, junior Carl Martin shooting a 221, junior Pradit Thongdy stroking a 225, and freshman Sean Warren chipping in with 258 strokes.

Behind Madras and Mac-Hi in the team race were: Enterprise, 730; Joseph, 752; Burns, 786; Heppner, 832; and Riverside, 892.

Head coach Duane Neiffer acknowledged the play of Kenison, Martin, and Struthers during the season.

"Keith provided valuable leadership for our younger players this season and will be sorely missed next season," he said. "Carl was probably our most improved player over the course of the season and was our most consistent player along with Dan who was our best boys player this season and was the team's medalist."

Also adding contributions to the boys varsity team this season were seniors Reid Duncan and Marion McMillan; junior Bert Cason; and sophomore Bill Turner.
