Winter wheat production forecast

Oregon's 1986 winter wheat production is forecast at 57.7 million bushels based on conditions as of May 1, according to the Oregon Crop and Livestock Reporting Service. This is 11% above the 1985 winter wheat production but 13% below the 1984 crop. May conditions point to a yield of 62 bushels per acre which, if realized, would be 8 bushels per acre more than last year, but 1 bushel per acre less than the record high yield of 1984. Growers anticipate harvesting 930,000 acres, 30,000 acres less than last year.

Hay stocks on Oregon farms on May 1, 1986 total 179,000 tons, 18% below last year's holdings and 36% below stocks on hand two years ago.

Winter wheat production in the three Pacific Northwest States of Oregon, Washington and Idaho is expected to total 234.3 million bushels this year, 10% above the 1985 output but 14% below the 1984 crop.

Winter wheat production in the United States is forecast at 1.60 billion bushels as of May 1, 1986, the lowest level since 1979. The forecasted production is down 12% from 1985's production, due primarily to a sharp decline in harvested acreage.

Growers expect to harvest 42.8 million acres for grain, 11% less than last year. Acres for harvest are 79% of the seeded total. Producers harvested 83% of the 1985 planted acres for grain. Yields are expected to average 37.4 bushels per acre, down 0.7 of a bushel from last year.

May 1 hay stocks on farms totaled 27.1 million tons, up 1% from May 1, 1985.
