Bedding plants start garden quickly with little fuss

Want to add some fast color to the yard with annual or perennial flowers, or get the vegetable garden off and running with a minimum of fuss? Try some of the ornamental and vegetable bedding plants available at garden stores now, says Fred Lundin, Ag Agent, Morrow County Extension Office. Here are a few tips for success with bedding plants:

*Don't plant outside until the season in your area has warmed enough for the plants to grow.

*Select plants that are well-established in their containers, but are not overgrown. Bedding plants often transplant better if they are not yet blooming.

*Allow plants to harden off (adjust) to your conditions before planting. Bring the plants home and set them outside in a protected place, but exposed to your area's temperature and humidity conditions, for several days.

*Protect the bedding plant roots from drying until planted.

*When planting, set plants at the recommended spacing.

*Plant in late afternoon or early evening. Plant into moist soil.

*Plant bedding plants at the same depth at which they were previously growing.

*Retain as much soil on the roots as possible.

County Agent's Corner

We're having a weed tour Wednesday afternoon June 11. We'll be looking at controlling cheatgrass in small grains, and economic reclamation of knapweed infested rangeland. The tour starts at the Lone City Park at 2 p.m. and includes a barbecue.

Now is the time to prune any spruce flowering shrubs which have finished flowering. Pruning now encourages flowering next year.

It's also time to prune hedges. Pruning now, after the spring flush of new growth appears, helps the hedge keep its shape for the summer.

Prune hedges wider at the bottom than at the top, so the sun will reach the base. This encourages leaf growth all the way to the ground, and limits "legginess" in a hedge.

The codling moth is a season-long pest, and apple and pear trees must be sprayed every three weeks until harvest to have worm-free fruit.

Several pesticides are labeled for codling moths. Sevin works well and is relatively safe. Read the label before applying pesticides: Read the label, Read the *!#%+ label, and Read the !#%*!#! label!

Everyone has a rhubarb plant in their yard. It's a popular, early fruit, bright and cheerful first thing in the spring.

Rhubarb is a hardy vegetable. It overwinters well, and tolerates droughty conditions, also. It uses large amount of fertilizer, so apply a complete (16-8-8) fertilizer after you are finished harvesting.

Harvest during April and May in this county. Grasp the petiole (stalk) down near the crown and pull. Do not cut the stalk off. This limits regrowth from the crown bud.

Rhubarb leaves contain a high amount of oxalic acid which make them unfit for food under any circumstances.

Any harvest of summer growth retards regrowth and yield in the spring. Extension Circular 797 (free

at the Extension Office) discusses growing rhubarb.

Lawn moths or millers are the adult form of a very bad lawn pest-the sod webworm. you will see the small gray moths in the evening flying low over the lawn.

The larvae attack bentgrass, bluegrass, fescue, and other grasses. Irregular brown spots in the lawn are the first sign of damage. If the infestation is heavy, large areas of grass may be damaged severely or destroyed in only a few days.

You can find the worms by breaking apart the dry sod.

They live in silk-lined tubes about a half-inch in diameter that extend two to three inches into the soil. If there are three or four of them in a 6-inch square section, apply an insecticide. Several are labeled for lawn moths.

If Sevin or diazinon are used, mow the lawn to rid it of any clover flowers, and remove the clippings. These pesticides are highly toxic to bees. Keep children and pets off the lawn until it has been thoroughly watered after treatment and the grass is completely dry. Read the label before applying any pesticide.

Big fish story

Talk about your big fish stories. Biologists at Michigan State University are exploring ways to produce 70 pound salmon by placing eggs in warm water, reports an international wildlife magazine. The higher temperature prevents fish from undergoing a key growth stage, making them sterile and overdeveloped.
