Methodist propose peace study

The bishops of the United Methodist Church found strong support for their proposed peace study among the denomination's 220 churches in Oregon and Idaho at a meeting June 9-13 in Salem. The denomination's Oregon-Idaho Annual Conference voted to endorse a study entitled "In Defense of Creation: The Nuclear Crisis and a Just Peace." The document was authored by church's Council of Bishops. Attending the conference last week were the Rev. Don Boyce, pastor of the Heppner United Methodist Church, and Justine Weatherford, the elected lay member from the church. The document calls for all of the 38,500 local churches and 9.2 million members to engage in a study using the Bible and the bishops' statement as foundation documents. The bishops' pastoral letter calls into question the morality of a nuclear deterrence, as well as the theory of a "just war." It calls for a comprehensive test ban, a multilateral and mutually verifiable nuclear weapons freeze, and "the ultimate dismantling of all such weapons, and bans on all space weapons." They pleaded for a "political climate conducive to negotiations."

4-H summer camp slated for late June

"We are the World" 4-H summer camp, is set for late June. All fourth through seventh grade 4-H members received notices inviting them to attend, said an Extension Service spokesperson. Campers from Morrow, Gilliam, Wheeler and Warm Springs quickly filled the camp to overflowing. Counselors, too, come from each of the counties with more older youth interested in counseling than are needed. Camp size is limited by number of tents available to serve as "homes" for the campers, and by accommodation available in the dining/kitchen area. The camp program includes games, hikes, outdoor activities, and crafts, as well as various educational classes. Site of the camp is Cutsforth Park. Extension staff from all counties involved participate in the program, with Elva Madden, Extension Agent, Wheeler County serving as director this year. Francine Evans, Irrigation is volunteer cook; Sheridan Tarnasky, Heppner is volunteer nurse.

Youth from all parts of Oregon are involved, so opportunities are many for developing new friends. Campers reside in a frame building with a large recreation-dining hall adjoining. In looking at state flags she showed that Oregon and Massachusetts are the only states with a design on both sides of the flags. In conclusion she read the poem "God Bless America" by Helen Steiner Rice, which dealt with patriotism and our flag.
