Assistants, and State Chairmen, interesting and informative addresses were given by Pacific Region Director, Mrs. Lillian Pethel of Kamiah, Idaho; Director of Southern Oregon Historical Society, Nick Clark, on the Hanley Farm; Multnomah County Extension Agent and garden writer for the Portland Oregonian, Ray McNeilan, on new devices and techniques in gardening; Director of Nature Conservancy Projects in Oregon, Sam Johnson, on "An Armchair Tour of Oregon's Finest Natural Areas"—a beautiful slide with sound presentation.

Mealtime musical entertainment was outstanding with choirs, groups and soloists plus a Fashion Show by eight J.C. Penny models. The featured Flower Arranging program was done by Mrs. Pat Crawford of Kent, Washington. She was creative and practical with her use of ordinary and found materials.

Even though the day was very warm, the afternoon tour of the Japanese Gardens and the downtown area of Portland was delightful.

On the final night awards were given to those hard-working clubs and individuals who made the effort to do something extra. Pat Pettyjohn of Ione won a blue ribbon and \$15 on her horticulture essay, "Wanted, Pelargonium alias Geranium." Heppner Garden Club received first place with the club history book. The Condon Club received first for their yearbook. Eva Lou Greiner of the Condon Club won a blue on her bird scrapbook and the coveted bird trophy. In the Junior Division Derek Osmin, fifth grader of Ione, won a first place on his Conservation poster. Melissa Rowell, Ione eighth grader won first place in Division 3 in the Smokey Bear-Woodsy Owl Poster contest. Susan Wilcke, Olex, won third in Division 2. Crystal Minster, Ione fifth grader took an honorable mention on her essay, "The Douglas Fir." Other clubs in District No. 10 took home special awards. Many clubs in the district, including Ione and Heppner, received certificates of appreciation for contributions, both monetary and labor, to state projects.

Eighty-one year old Fred Etling of Milton-Freewater won the \$100 Conservation Award for his years of work with the Marie Dorian Memorial Park. He was present to receive the award and to tell about his volunteer work in the park.

Oregon Wildflowers were viewed with a slide presentation which included those entered in the state contest. Winners were announced.

County Agent's Corner

As leaves on ornamental trees and shrubs in the home landscape began popping out this spring, tent caterpillars have been appearing also. Many homeowners have noticed the small web tents these pests build in landscape trees.

Tent caterpillars are commonly found on fruit trees, willows, cottonwoods, birches, and alders, but may be found on other ornamental trees as well. They can cause considerable damage by completely stripping a tree of leaves.

Although this won't kill the tree, it makes it more susceptible to damage from disease. Tent caterpillars are colorful insects. They are hairy and about one and one half inches long when full grown. They have brown bodies with rows of blue and yellow spots on the back.

As they hatch, starting about mid-April, the caterpillars feed on near by leaves. They begin to form a webbing, called a tent, in which they spend a great deal of time, especially at night. The web tents are usually visible at the ends of tree branches. As the caterpillars grow, so do the tents.

After the caterpillars eat the leaves close to the nest, they move farther away in search of more food. If you control the caterpillars early enough, you'll catch them all near the webbing.

Pruning, or spraying with insecticides, can provide control. Single nests can be cut out of a tree or shrub and burned. This is effective because the webbing will be the only infestation in that particular spot in the tree.

If the infestation is heavy or hard to reach, spraying is the best method. Malathion, Diazinon, Orthene and Sevin are registered for use on tent caterpillars. Sevin should not be used around flowering plants because bees may carry the residue back to the hive and destroy the whole bee colony.

All these sprays are best used in the early morning or late evening when temperatures are lower and bees are less active. Evening and early morning are also the best times to spray or prune because the caterpillars tend to congregate in the web overnight.

Dipel and Thuricide are biological control alternatives to the other sprays. Biological insecticides are slower working, but they are relatively safe for other insects and animal life.
