

Winter wheat crop forecast

Oregon's winter wheat crop is forecast at 53.9 million bushels, four percent above last year's crop but 18 percent below the 1984 crop, according to the Oregon Crop and Livestock Reporting Service. Acres for harvest, at 930,000 acres, are down 30,000 acres from 1985. This was more than off set by higher anticipated yields over last year. Based on conditions as of June 1, 1986, yields of winter wheat are expected to average 58.0 bushels per acre, 4 bushels above last year but 5 bushels below the record high yield of 63.0 set in 1984.

Nationally, winter wheat production is forecast at 1.58 billion bushels as of June 1, 1986. This is down 14 percent from 1985 and is the lowest production level since 1978. Area for harvest totals 42.8 million acres, 11 percent less than last year. Yields are expected to average 36.8 bushels per acre, down 1.3 bushels from last year and 0.6 of a bushel from May 1.

The Sixth Man

Strawberries and cream are most often associated with the grass courts of the premiere tennis event in the world, but John McEnroe, also associated with Wimbledon quite frequently, will take his hot temper and rising fines away this year.

McEnroe, who won the event from 1981-84, and the top-ranked player in the world during that time, is not showing at the all-England club this summer as he is on paternity leave with fiancée Tatum O'Neal.

What, No McEnroe? And I thought tennis was already boring on television.

First off not having McEnroe will not dampen Wimbledon, and second of all, tennis, particularly Wimbledon, isn't boring on television.

With the abstention of McEnroe, Czech Ivan Lendl, the world's number one men's player, will be the favorite for his first Wimbledon crown. But it won't be easy as there's a host of other good players ready to reign.

West German Boris Becker won Wimbledon last year becoming the youngest player (18) ever to capture that title and also the first unseeded player ever to capture that event. Becker, with the booming serve, will probably go in as the number three seed, but is probably the best bet to meet Lendl in the finals.

The second seed, Sweden's Mats Wilander won the 1985 French Open. (Lendl won that title this year but he plays better on the clay courts the French possess than grass.) Look for Wilander to be prone to an early upset.

The man who upset Becker at the French Open, Swede Mikael Pernfors advanced all the way to the finals before losing to Lendl. Pernfors was a two-time NCAA champ at Georgia and appears to be riding the same roller coaster to Wimbledon that Becker did a year ago.

Several others appear to be in line if the above players falter. Andres Chesnokov, a 20-year-old Russian upset Wilander in the French and is another good young player.

Jimmy Connors, after serving a 107 week suspension, looked sharp in his first tournament back.

Kevin Curren also plays well at Wimbledon and met Becker in the finals a year ago.

On the women's side it looks like another Chris Evert Lloyd-Martina Navratilova final as the two just keep getting better and better.

If something goes fatally wrong, if Evert Lloyd or Navratilova gets upset that is, Czech Hana Mandlikova (last year's U.S. Open champ) may win it all.

But there are two darkhorses I like who could contend for the top spot.

One is Canadian Carling Bassett who seems to be playing with inspiration after the death of her father (USFL Tampa Bay Bandit owner John Bassett).

The other one is Mary Joe Fernandez, only 14-years-old from Miami who played quite well in the French.

Others to watch include Steffi Graf, Kathy Jordan, Kathy Rinaldi, and Pam Shriver.

On another note, last week's National Basketball Association draft was most interesting.

Cleveland appears to be a force to be reckoned with through a couple of trades and draft picks thereby landing Brad Daugherty, Ron Harper, and Mark Pierce.

On the local front, I thought the Portland Trail Blazers made a good pick in taking the UPI's player of the year in Walter Berry, but how about the selection of Russian star Arvidis Sabonis? If Sabonis plays for the Blazers it could be the steal of the century. Chances of Sabonis leaving the Soviet Union are slim and none however.

All this coupled with the tragic death of Maryland's Ben Bias, the second overall pick of the Boston Celtics, and who knows what's next in the rough and tumble life of professional athletes?
