Funeral services for Frieda A. Majeske will be held Thursday, July 3, at 11 a.m. at the Lexington Baptist Church with vault interment at the Lexington Cemetery.

Mrs. Majeske, 85, of Heppner, died Monday, June 30, 1986, at Pioneer Memorial Hospital.

She was born Nov. 21, 1900, in Marathon, Wis., the daughter of Carl and Matilda (Koetke) Kurth. She came to this area in 1919 and was married to Adolph Majeske on April 5, 1920, at Nolin.

The couple came to Morrow County in 1922 and farmed in the lone and Lexington areas.

Mrs. Majeske was a member of the Lexington Christian Church, Holly Rebekah Lodge 139, the Decoration of Chivalry, Ladies Auxiliary of the Patriarch's Militant and the Lexington Grange.

For many years Mrs. Majeske was superintendent of flowers as a volunteer for the Morrow County Fair.

She is survived by a son, Gene, of Lexington; daughters, Pat Wright of Lexington and Audrey Mounts of Gresham; six grandchildren and seven great-grandchildren.

Her husband preceded her in death in 1973.
