### Applications for leadership course available

Applications for a leadership course with emphasis on public policy are available at the Morrow

and Umatilla County Extension offices.

Four to five participants from this area will be selected to be part of sixty Oregon participants at the fifth Oregon Extension Family Community Leadership Training Institute which will be held at the Collins Retreat Center, Sandy, Oregon, October 27-29, 1986 reports an Extension news release. There will be a \$15 registration fee (plus transportation costs), but meals and lodging are covered by a grant from the Kellogg Foundation.

The training is open to anyone regardless of age, sex, race, or religion. Focus of the leadership training and the goal of the program is prepare Oregon citizens to become involved and effective in solving community problems.

Participants in the program need no experience, but should be interested in community involvement. They will be asked to pledge two days per month for one year to work on local activities of the Family Community Leadership Program, said Greg Tillson, state coordinator, FCL.

Participants who complete 30 hours of instruction and 20 hours of teaching will be certified as FCL trainers. Local trainers who attended in 1985 are Birdine Tullis, Charlotte Carpenter, and Claudia Hughes.

Six other states, Alaska, Colorado, Hawaii, New Mexico, Washington and Wyoming are presently involved in the FCL program. The program is also being disseminated nationally this fall.

The participants will hear state and local speakers and work with elected officials from around the state. In small group exercises they will "learn by doing" how to form a grassroots organization and how to make presentations to decision makers.

"Conference participants will have an opportunity to work in a mock neighborhood setting and solve a community problem," said Dawn C. Hawkins, county Extension agent.

Family Community Leadership is jointly sponsored by the OSU Extension Service and Oregon Extension Homemakers Council. Applications are available in local Extension offices and must be returned by July 18.
