\*EXPLANATION: The district's tax base for 1986-87 is \$834,809. The district does not have enough money from any other sources to operate educational, support, and extra-curricular programs for the entire year. The district needs all of the money it is allowed to raise in a one year "special levy" for operational purposes in 1986-87. This measure will allow the district to levy \$5,140,643 above its tax base in 1986-87. This amount plus the tax base amount and other amounts from federal, state, and county sources will enable the district to maintain all programs at levels reduced from 1985-86.
