Japanese asking for wheat samples

The Japanese government needs samples of wheat for assessing the quality of the 1986 crop. The Japanese Millers and Banking Association is interested in receiving samples of specific varieties from specific areas of the state. They have asked for samples of Stephens,

Hill 81, Twin and Dirkwin from Morrow County.

Each sample will need to be at least 10 pounds. Samples should be placed in bags (a double grocery bag is fine), and labeled as to the variety and county of origin. Specific growers need not be identified.

Three collection points have been established. Samples can be taken or sent to the OWGL office in Pendleton, or the O.W.C. office in Portland, or to the Morrow County Extension Office. Samples sent direct or delivered in person to Pendleton or Portland should be

labeled "Noguchi Sample." These samples are needed by September 1, 1986.

Efforts of this type should help to maintain and/or expand wheat markets.
