OSU tells how to build inexpensive storm windows

If one of your summer projects is getting your home ready for winter you may be interested in a new publication on building storm windows. It's available from the Oregon State University Extension Service.

Written by Susan Vogt, OSU Extension energy agent, the publication tells how to build removable, durable, exterior storm windows with wood frames and 8-mil clear vinyl glazing.

Vogt said the windows cost between 50 cents and a dollar per square foot, should last from seven to 10 years, and are easy to take down and put up again.

The publication lists tools and materials needed to build the storm windows. Drawings illustrate easy-to-follow steps.
