Canadian 4-H'er visits Heppner

Molly Wetherill, 17, Dawson Creek British Columbia, Canada, spent the week of August 25 - September 1 with the Bob McLaughlin family of Heppner as part of a 4-H exchange. Shannon McLaughlin spent a week in British Columbia earlier this summer on the other half of the exchange. She attended the Oregon State Fair and did some sightseeing near Heppner.

Wetherill and her brother John live with their parents Delbert and Gloria Wetherill on the family farm in the Peace River region of the province. She describes the farm as a medium-size, 200-acre, farm where they raise beef cattle, Morgan horses, hay and green feed. Her mom, she says, feeds the animals in the morning and she and her brother feed at night while her father is away working for the Department of Highways.

The Canadian 4-H'er shows horses in both English and Western classes and has shown some English class riding outside of 4-H. She also rodeos, competing in barrel racing, pole bending, keyhole, and the stake race.

Heppner native publishes book

Steve Warren, a former Heppner resident and a 1966 Heppner High graduate, is the author of a new book appearing in Utah and the Rocky Mountain region.

"Dra! Mythed Again" is an often humorous, sometimes incisive look at miscalculations and myths in Utah history, said a spokesperson for a Utah publishing house. It contains a cross section of folly ranging from the predicted evaporation of the Great Salt Lake (the lake reached an all-time high level this year) to the demise of the Mormon Church.

Although the book focuses on Utah, some well known Americans turn up on its pages including Richard Nixon, Jimmy Carter, Elvis Presley, Muhammad Ali, Jack Anderson, Henry Kissinger, and even Oregon's Danny Ainge, a Brigham Young University basketball player now with the Boston Celtics.

Warren has won numerous writing awards, continued the spokesperson. The 183-page book was published by Altair Publishing, Box 20024, West Valley City, Utah 84120.
