

Fillies teams drop games to Pirates

Capitalizing on inexperience on the part of all three Heppner volleyball teams, the Riverside Pirates defeated all three Filly teams in non-conference matches last Thursday.

Despite being swept 15-8, 15-8 in the varsity match, Heppner head coach Terri Gentry did see some positive things come out of the match.

"We had good attacks and we were able to pick up everything that came over the net at us," Gentry said. "We just need to gain a little more experience in varsity matches before we can compete with teams like Riverside. We should be able to give them a good match the next time we play them."

Gentry also had high praise for setters Tina Davidson and Sandi Turner. For Turner it was the first time she had been used as a setter in a match.

In the junior varsity match, the Fillies were able to extend the Pirates to three matches before falling 15-5, 10-15, 15-10.

As with the varsity match, experience was a factor according to Gentry. "Our players need some

more experience, but once they get that experience they will be contenders."

In the "C" team match, Heppner was once again able to take Riverside to three sets before losing 15-5, 4-15, 15-7.

This time numbers were a factor as freshman Jennifer Currin suffered an ankle injury during the match, forcing the Fillies to use only five players at times.

All three Heppner teams played at lone on Tuesday and will host Riverside on Thursday, with the junior varsity match kicking things off at 5 p.m.

On Saturday the varsity squad will travel to The Dalles for the Wahtonka Tournament. On the same day, the junior varsity will travel to Spray for that tournament. The Fillies captured both tournaments last year.

Heppner TV service increases \$2

Heppner TV service will cost more to members soon. The TV coop has a franchise with the city and was granted permission by city council to impose an increase of \$2 per month last week.

Judy Laughlin, manager of the coop, said there had been a loss in each month, except for March, since the first of the year. The coop has had to dip into reserve to continue operating. Projection for next year, with increased costs, show an expected \$760 per month operating loss.

Laughlin said it had been four

years since the monthly charge increased. Average cost for basic service in the state is \$11 per month, with one system as high as \$17.50. Present charge in Heppner is \$7 per month.

Nine new channels have been added to the local service, and one more will be activated during the next few months. All electronics in the system have been replaced during the last four years and customers are receiving better service.

The new rate will become effective after a TV board decision, Laughlin said.
