Appreciation dinner planned

The annual Morrow County Fair and Rodeo appreciation dinner is set for September 27 at 6 p.m. Lee Anstotegui will barbeque Basque-style lambs purchased at the recent auction sale at fair. The remainder of the meal will be potluck. All persons are invited to attend. Concluding the Saturday evening activities will be a dance at the fairgrounds pavilion with music for all ages by the Country Go-For Rock. Admission will be charged for the dance; \$3 single and \$5 couple.

Business before the Fair Board, includes suggestions and changes for next year. Immediate plans include carpeting the dormitory building for better multi-purpose use during the football season, weatherizing doors, putting a protective finish on the new fire escape, repairing gates and general upkeep of areas.

The Fair Board will hire a part-time secretary to replace Robin Jones. Applications have been received, and E.C.O.A.C. applicants also will be considered to alleviate budget spending.

The merit rating workbook was completed, giving the estimated fair attendance at 4463, including fair horse shows. The 1986 paid fair gate receipted \$2,200. Rodeo attendance netted \$4592 with 1428 attendance. Total amount of dollars paid in premiums was \$8,460, down \$3200

from last year due to a slight decrease in premium pay-out rates. The total number of exhibits reached 3,500 an increase of 250 over last year.

The format of the 1987 fair and rodeo will be decided at the meetings of fair and rodeo committees, with emphasis on scheduling of events in accordance with the wishes of the majority, while trying to balance budget spending. Reports of this year's audit were received at the September meeting accompanied by a letter from the County Judge, Don McElligott, commending the Fair Board on an excellent management job.

Five members indicated that they would attend the Flower Show School II to be held in Pendleton October 30 and November 1.

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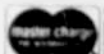
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Students hear state college reps

Students from Heppner High School will go to Pendleton High School for a meeting with representatives of Oregon's state colleges and universities on September 22 at 1 p.m.

Students from Ione High School will go to Riverside High School for a meeting with representatives of Oregon's state colleges and universities on September 24, 1 p.m.

This program supplements the counseling program at the schools by giving students first-hand information about program of study offerings, admission requirements, housing, costs to attend, financial aid, scholarships, and other information important to post-high school planning.

Parents are also encouraged to attend the program which will feature information sessions with representatives from Eastern Oregon State College, Western Oregon State College, Oregon Institute of Technology, Oregon State University, Portland State University, Southern Oregon State College, and the University of Oregon.

The Oregon State System of Higher Education high school visitation program reaches almost all public and private high schools in Oregon. The program's goal is to stimulate and guide post-high school planning by students and provide them with an introduction to the programs and services of Oregon's state colleges and universities.
