Heppner Methodists consider change

Bishop Cal McConnell of the Oregon-Idaho Conference of the United Methodist Church is appointing the Rev. Donald Boyce of the Heppner United Methodist Church to serve also as interim pastor of the Echo United Methodist Church. This added responsibility for the Rev. Boyce was announced to the Heppner congregation on Sunday, Sept. 14, by Doug Drake, chairman of the Pastor-Parish Committee of the Heppner Church which has met recently with District Superintendent Joe Walker, Bend, and with the Pastor-Parish Committee of the Echo Church.

Presently the historic Methodist Church is the only church functioning in the Echo community.

Preliminary planning is that the Rev. Boyce will conduct communion and preach once during most months in Echo and will meet there with the Administrative Board one weekday of each month. He will also be available for any emergencies or special services which require clergy leadership there.

The Heppner congregation, which has just begun its busy fall schedule, is now faced with the probability of adjusting its Sunday hours. It has been suggested that instead of changing to 11 a.m. worship on just that one Sunday that the Rev. Boyce will go to Echo, that the church here change from 10:30 to 11:00 a.m. worship regularly during the months Rev. Boyce is serving the Echo Church. This would mean that Heppner's Sunday School would meet at 9:30 a.m. At Echo, the Sunday worship would be at 9 a.m. and their Sunday School would meet at 10:30 after their worship service.

After the September congregational potluck dinner on Sunday,

Sept. 14, considerable discussion took place concerning the changing of Sunday hours. The matter has not been definitely settled yet.

Rev. Boyce announced that beginning Wednesday noon, Sept. 17, a brown-bag noon-hour Bible Study Class will begin. On Sunday evenings Sept. 21 and 28, there will be membership classes intended for

both members who wish to renew their understandings and for non-members who wish to learn about the United Methodist Church.

Wednesday evening, Sept. 17, at 6 p.m., Junior High Youth (grades 7 and 8) are cordially invited to come to the church basement for a pizza supper and organizational meeting to talk over activities for this year.
