The first grade said a poem about good manners. Part of the poem said, "Bugs pinch, bugs bite, but children shouldn't, it's not polite." Children dressed in appropriate animal hats.

The sixth grade shared poems about encouraging peace. They also illustrated the flag of the United Nations.

The second grade made a friendship banner which shared their ideas

about friendship.

The third grade illustrated flags for the nations of the world.

Cooperative rather than competitive games were played during the program.

Mrs. Diana Kincaid led the group in singing "It's a Small World", "Let There Be Peace On Earth", and "I'd Like to Teach the World to Sing". Mrs. Kincaid's fourth grade also made a United Nation's bulletin board illustrated with people of the world and the word "Peace" written in each nation's language.

Children and teachers agreed that the program had helped make them more aware of the needs of those around them and the importance of world peace, concluded the spokesperson.

Explains humane society's functions

To the Editor:

Residents of Umatilla and Morrow Counties:

She said: "I didn't know that about the Humane Society"...and maybe you don't either.

With this letter we begin a series of informative releases. We suggest you clip and save them.

How to Find Us! We are "Pioneer Humane Society", under "Humane Societies" in the yellow pages. Our address: Box 361, Hermiston; phone 567-2961 which accesses an information tape which tells you what to do and whom to call in the following emergencies: "Lost, found and injured animals, and cruelty cases."

The tape also lists the numbers of two volunteers. If you need additional help, one or both of these people are on 24 hour duty to assist you.

False Expectations: to make clear what we can do, let's outline what some people expect of us, that we cannot do:

1. We cannot pick up animals, we are not connected with animal control or with the pounds in any way.
2. We cannot, instantly, solve your problems. We can guide you to a solution, and offer several alternatives, but all take time.
3. We cannot afford a shelter, therefore we must ask you to shelter the animals you find, until they can be placed, or you and we can cooperate to have them euthanized (put to sleep).

But we can guide you to the solution of almost any animal problem common to this area: for lost and found animals, we use our radio broadcasts, Pet of the Week photos in the "East Oregonian", our "wanted" files, and experienced advice to guide you through ways to

help yourself. For cruelty cases, we provide liaison with the law enforcement people, information on Oregon Humane Law, and the steps that need to be taken to get the cruelty stopped.

For sick or injured animals, call your local law enforcement officers. If they are unable to help you, call our volunteer, and together you and we will cooperate to get the animal euthanized.

Since our income is limited, we shall ask for such donation as you feel able to give.
