Wheat exports not directly affected by South Africa

"Market development is awfully difficult when political concerns start to weigh against trade," states Jack Hay, The Dalles, president of the Oregon Wheat Growers League. "If the South African government does fully retaliate to the Senate override and bar importation or transshipment of U.S. wheat, it will not directly impact Pacific Northwest soft white wheat sales," continued Hay. Still, any interruption of the wheat export market tends to create ever-widening ripples in the marketplace.

The South African government threatened to stop importing American grain if the U.S. Senate voted to override President Reagan's veto of a bill imposing economic sanctions. Wheat growers, as well as other importing industries, are again finding themselves caught between international political tensions and the ability to conduct business. The Sanctions Bill bans new investment and new bank loans to South African businesses; the bill also bans importation of South African steel, iron, coal, agricultural products, and military vehicles.

In retaliation to the Senate override, South African Foreign Minister R.F. Botha threatened to cancel all U.S. wheat imports for South African consumption or for trans-

shipment to other African nations. Currently South African wheat purchases total 5.9 million bushels of U.S. Hard Red winter wheat.

"It certainly is difficult to concentrate on developing export markets when political decisions impede trade," states Don Starr, Oregon Wheat Growers League Marketing Committee chairman.

Oregon has been active in market development in Asia and the Middle East and is currently working to open markets in the eastern Soviet Union. "Political interference with trade is nothing new. Our nation has embargoed grain shipments to the Soviets in the past, and we have been embargoed against," Starr continued. "All that political actions do for wheat exports is to increase the piles stored at home."

Furnace fan needs supply of air

Q. Every time I turn on my electric furnace I smell creosote in the living room. That's where my fireplace insert is, but I never use it. My chimney has just been cleaned. Can you tell me where the smell is coming from? The furnace is located in the utility room off the kitchen.

A. It's hard to say without visiting your home. But it sounds as if the furnace fan is creating negative pressure because it can't get enough supply air. This draws the air down the chimney, bringing the odor into the living room.

Try opening the door to the utility room when the furnace is on. This may give it enough air. If that helps, either leave the door open or have a vent cut into the door. Also check to see if there's anything blocking the supply side of the fan.

Q. What's the best location in a home for an electric water heater?

-L.G., Medford.

A. Locate a water heater in the heated space of your home as close as possible to where you use the most hot water. Standby heat loss will be reduced in the warm location, and the loss that does occur adds heat to the space.

Avoid long pipe runs because the pipe dissipates heat as water runs through it. After you turn off the faucet, hot water in the pipe continues to lose heat. Short, insulated pipe runs minimize this heat loss.

If you're buying a new water heater look for a well-insulated model, at least R-16. Many retail

stores now carry water heaters insulated to R-20.

Q. We had a chimney fire last January. Even though the chimney had been cleaned in September, we apparently built up enough creosote in four months to set off the blaze. Our chimney sweep suggests building hotter fires and installing a flue liner. Will this stop the creosote? - M. D. Roseburg.

A. Nothing will stop creosote from forming, but lots of things will minimize it.

Hot fires are the most effective. You can use a chimney or stove top thermometer to measure flue gas temperatures. This will help you keep the temperature above the point of creosote condensation. The critical temperature will vary with the wood stove, but keeping gases above 250 degrees Fahrenheit is a good start.

As for the flue liner, it can minimize creosote by enhancing the chimney draft and by insulating flue gases so they don't cool down before they exit the chimney.

Flue liners for wood heat systems are made of stainless steel, poured masonry or tile. They are most effective at reducing creosote when they're installed in large fireplace chimneys where the flue is grossly

oversized for the wood stove or fireplace insert.
