"This award is for the whole dealership," said Prickett. "Only 30 percent (of the dealers) make any category (Bronze, silver or gold)." Prickett said dealers are judged on sales, their facility and their employees.

Port announces talks with training school

Port of Morrow Commission President Louis Carlson announced the port is negotiating with Ed Harper, Training director for the International Union of Operating Engineers (I.U.O.E.), Local 701-AGC to relocate the union's apprenticeship and training program onto port property. Carlson made the announcement at the commission's regular meeting last Wednesday.

Harper told the commission that they have begun to move equipment from Corvallis and expect to have all of their equipment moved here before winter sets in. Later, in a phone interview Harper said they had decided to halt equipment movement until a final agreement was reached with the port.

Harper said the training committee instructs 60 to 90 apprentices and 200 to 260 journeymen through their heavy equipment operators program per year. Students come to the school from all over Oregon and from five counties in Washington state. Each class runs for four weeks with an average of 18 students per class. Three instructors will permanently locate to the area.

Harper stressed to the audience that the program would not replace or displace employees at the port. "We hope to have a good relationship and be an asset to the community," he said.

John O'Reilly of Ready Mix and Ken Evans, a port tenant expressed concern to the commission that having the instruction school here would cut into private contractors business. Harper assured the men,

"We will not pave roads, build streets, overpasses, etcetera, if we do, it will be in conjunction with someone else," Harper continued. "Anything that has been or can be bid we're not going to do."

Evans, still not convinced angrily took the port to task for allowing Gourmet Brands to use the port's DC-8 Caterpillar instead of having private business do the work.

Harper told Evans that every job the school would do would be reviewed. "I believe in private enterprise," he said. "Without it you, or I, or anybody else is not going to survive in this country. I'll be glad to sit down and talk to you or anyone about this."

"If we can work together and make things happen there will be more work for everybody. I'll work with you if you allow me to," Harper added.

Harper said the school found eastern Oregon appealing because

of the mild climate. Advantages would be less maintenance on equipment because of salt water and beach sand problems on the coast. The climate offers year-round training.

Louis Carlson pointed out that having the program here would have a positive economic impact on local businesses (motels, restaurants, etc.). "We think this is going to be beneficial to the community," he stated.

Port Manager R.L. "Bob" Miller mentioned that the school has the capabilities to respond to a hazardous waste incident if one occurred. "We're excited (the North Morrow Medical Board), and this includes the local doctor, about having a first responder for hazardous waste here," he told the commission.

The commission approved a motion to continue negotiations with the I.U.O.E. in hopes of relocating the training program permanently to Boardman.
