

## W.C.C.C. joins Ore. golf assoc.

Scott Miller and Chad Smith led the onslaught as the Condon Blue Devils ran away to a 62-0 victory over the lone Cardinals in Big Sky Conference football action last Friday night.

The loss left Ione at 2-2 in Big Sky play but the Cardinals received some consolation when they traded a victory for a non-conference loss to the Long Creek Mountaineers (a 44-8 loss) when Long Creek had to forfeit because they had a player who illegally transferred to the school.

Miller ran for 72 yards on only five carries while Smith racked up 54 yards on nine tries. Miller also scored two touchdowns while Smith added three touchdowns.

The Blue Devil defense also had a good game as well, limiting the Cardinals gained only 57 yards of total offense. However, three lone quarterbacks did throw for 88 yards.

Condon struck for 32 points in the first period and added 14 in the second quarter for a 46-0 half time advantage.

The Cardinals have one conference game remaining with a date this Friday at Echo beginning at 7:30 p.m.

Ione is still in contention for the

second Big Sky playoff berth but trails both Echo (2-1) and Dufur (1-1). Dufur though has an advantage over the Cardinals by virtue of a 40-20 win earlier in the season.

"We're looking forward to playing Echo and hopefully coming out of there with a win," said head coach David Presley. "The loss to Dufur may have sealed our fate, but if we can beat Echo and Echo then beats Dufur we have a chance. Even if we don't make the playoffs the season has still been good to me."

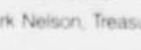
