Extension offers housework tips

"Is There Life After Housework?" is the program theme for Don Aslett, nationally known author, business man and humorist, who is coming to Pendleton Friday, November 7, 7 p.m. at the Vert Auditorium. The three-hour program is sponsored by the Umatilla County Extension Home Extension Advisory Council.

Don Aslett travels around the country with a white suitcase shaped like a toilet bowl.
 "It's an image thing, says Aslett, who heads a nationwide janitorial service, holds seminars on "preventive housework," and is the author of a soft-cover book for housewives called "Is There Life After Housework?"
 "Lawyers have their big yellow legal pads to carry around. Doctors have their bags of medicine. But what do the eight million janitors and sixty million homemakers have as image makers?" Asks Aslett, half seriously.

"I had this," he says referring to his toilet bowl suitcase, "made to order and it sure gets a lot of attention in airports and hotels."

Aslett is an advocate for the housewife and appreciates the difficulties of her job. He wants her to get credit for what she does. He also wants to show her how to spend less time on housework while doing it more efficiently and cheaply.
 "Housework should be done with the same attitude as commercial cleaning, Aslett says. He's been in many, many homes--some very plush and beautiful--and he says nine times out of ten, the vacuum cleaner is half-working, the scissors are dull, the sewing machine is inefficient. Aslett advises buying good equipment and cleaning products (often commercial supply houses are great sources), and then keeping them working at top efficiency.

Twenty-five years ago when he attended the University of Idaho in his home town of Pocatello, Aslett worked his way through school by cleaning houses. He was so busy, he soon was hiring other students to help him.
 Even though he eventually got his teaching degree, Aslett never gave up the cleaning business. It just grew and grew until now he has about 2,000 employees and some of the biggest commercial clients in the country.

He talks about the lack of appreciation and recognition housewives endure from their families--and the public in general; the fact that many women lack confidence in their own knowledge of housework because commercials are always telling them to use something else or wear an evening dress while washing the kitchen floor; and his feeling that sharing love and time with the family should be given preference over enslavement to a clean house.
 Cost of the program is \$4. Advance tickets are available from county Extension offices and advisory council members.

Road department completes summer projects

The Morrow County Road Dept. has paved or resurfaced 41.9 miles of road this summer compared with 42 miles last year. The county was able to blade patch 25 miles and a 7 1/2 mile (four miles on Alpine Road and 3.5 miles on Parkers Mill Road) magnesium brine experimental project on difficult-to-maintain gravel roads.

A construction project on Basey-Sanford Canyon will be completed by December and construction on Rhea Creek from Sanford Canyon to Road Canyon is substantially completed. Gravel for both projects is stockpiled which will allow completion of the gravel surface this fall, said Morrow County Judge Don McElligott.

Crusher operations were contracted to United Crusher Consultants of Pendleton. United operates on a basic \$1/yard for 1/2 inch minus road rock with adjustments up or down depending product quality. United is responsible for maintenance, service, and repair of Morrow crusher. Morrow

County is responsible for major overhauls, fuel, and lubes. Direct costs for the first period of this year (includes payment to United) were \$2.26 per yard. Depreciation 25%. Drilling and royalties \$1 for a total of \$3.56 1/2 per yard. This compares to the cost of \$7 reported by Roadmaster Don Ball last year said McElligott. We believe that the absolute minimum for direct costs would be \$1.75 with anything under \$2.20 being acceptable. Depreciation should be constant at 25%. Drilling and royalties will range from 50¢ to \$1.15 per yard of product.

The county road crew completed the following projects during the 1986 season: (Roads listed as blade patched and resurfaced were first repaired by grading on an asphalt mix and then by applying a chip seal.)
