

# Ione takes 2nd place Mustangs clinch winning season at District

The Ione Cardinals had favored Arlington on the ropes Saturday, before letting it all slip away in the third and deciding game of the District 3B volleyball championships.

The Cards had Arlington down 10-2 when the Honkers 6-foot-2 junior ace Jennifer Sharp rotated to the front line and recorded seven kills to ice the victory, and give Arlington a 11-15, 15-1, 15-3 win.

The Cardinal volleyball team took home the second place district trophy.

Scott Buschke gave himself an early birthday present last Friday night in the Heppner Mustangs Columbia Basin Conference season ending 7-0 football victory over the Pilot Rock Rockets.

Buschke had his second consecutive 100-yard rushing game with 146 yards on 25 carries and the Mustangs only touchdown. Buschke, who celebrated his 18th birthday last Saturday, helped the Mustangs finish 5-3 in CBC play and 5-4 overall to give Heppner its first winning season since 1982.

Buschke though was quick to give credit where credit was due.

"I couldn't have done it without the blocking of our offensive line," he said, mentioning the efforts of centers Kevin Currutt, and Arkie Smith, guards Scott Dougherty and Gene Harris, tackles Jason Palmer and Bob Riehl, and tight end Troy Hyatt, all seniors along with Buschke.

"It was nice to end the season with a win," head coach Tim Birkby said who, in his second year, had helped the Mustang fans forget about an 0-9 season two years ago.

Riehl and Hyatt also shone defensively with 13 and eight tackles respectively. Riehl had 22 total defensive points and Hyatt 16.

The Heppner defense held the Rockets to just 77 yards of total offense. Rocket running back Jerry Lankford, one of the CBC's best, was held to 31 yards on 13 carries. Quarterback Tucker Hodgen did complete 12 of 20 passes, but for only 44 yards and was sacked four times for 20 yards in losses. Hyatt had 2 1/2 sacks and Riehl 1.

Things started out well for Heppner in the first period and pointed towards an easy blowout for the Mustangs. On fourth down-and-one from its own 48, Heppner quarterback Joe Taylor took off on the option for eight yards and then pitched to Buschke who gained seven more for a first down at the Pilot Rock 37. Buschke gained seven more yards to the 30 and a penalty moved the ball to the 25.

On the next play Buschke shook loose several Rocket tacklers and

then scampered down the left sideline for a 25-yard touchdown. Following Craig Angell's extra point, Heppner led 7-0 with 6:15 left in the first period.

But the Rockets had a chance to score later in the period when Russell Britt fumbled a Pilot Rock punt and the Rockets took over on the Mustang 44-yard line.

A penalty put Pilot Rock on the 29 before the Heppner defense held and took over on downs on its own 22. Heppner threatened to score in the second quarter, but this time it was the Rocket defense that held.

Scott Jones, seeing playing time for the first time in the month of October, carried three times for 16 yards to move the Mustangs from the Pilot Rock 48 to 32.

From there Bryan Padberg went inside on a reverse for 15 yards to the 17 for a first down. A penalty on the play moved the ball to the 10.

After Taylor was sacked on the 11, Buschke went six yards to the five, but on fourth-and-goal Buschke was stopped short of the end zone.

Neither team could score during the rest of the first half as Heppner took its 7-0 lead into halftime.

The third quarter was a defensive standoff as the Mustangs could gain only 11 net yards and the Rockets seven net yards.

The Mustangs were able to march to the Rocket 48 after taking the second half kickoff but turned the ball over on a fumble. Pilot Rock though could only get to the Heppner 42.

The Mustangs had the ball inside the Rocket 40 twice early in the fourth quarter but were unable to capitalize as Pilot Rock was still in the game.

The Rockets took over on their own 38 with 3:18 left in the game as Hodgen tried to rally his team. Hodgen hooked up with Rick Rasmussen for 15 yards on fourth-and-eight from the Pilot Rock 40 to put the Rockets on the Heppner 45.

On third-and-eight Dick Devin ended the Pilot Rock drive with an interception on the Heppner 26 and return to the 32.

Buschke carried five times for 33 yards to move the Mustangs to the Rocket 35 before time ran out.

Heppner will lose 10 seniors off this year's roster. Nine of those seniors started on offense for the Mustangs last Friday night and seven started on defense.

## Offensive players awarded

Scott Buschke and Jason Palmer ended their high school football careers in fine fashion last Friday as the two seniors helped pave the way for the Heppner Mustangs season-ending Columbia Basin Conference football win over the Pilot Rock Rockets. For their efforts Buschke and Palmer were rewarded by Mustang head coach Tim Birkby as co-Offensive Players of the Week.

It was the second straight game that Buschke garnered the Offensive Player of the Week award with his second straight 100-yard rushing game.

Two weeks ago Buschke became the first Mustang rusher to go over the 100-yard mark all season with 108 yards on 19 carries against the Wasco County Redsides.

Friday night Buschke ran all through the Rocket defense with 146 yards on 25 attempts and had the Mustangs only touchdown in their 7-0 victory.

Palmer, a starting tackle, helped the rest of the Heppner offensive line open up huge holes for Buschke and the rest of the Mustang running backs. Heppner was able to pick up 183 yards on the ground and 209 total yards.

Senior defensive linemen Troy Hyatt and Bob Riehl were named as co-Defensive Players of the Week for their contributions in Heppner's 7-0 Columbia Basin Conference football season ending victory over the Pilot Rock Rockets last Friday night.

Hyatt had 2 1/2 quarterback sacks on the Rockets freshman quarterback, Tucker Hodgen. Four of Hyatt's eight tackles went for losses. Hyatt had 17 total defensive points on the night.

On the season Hyatt led the Mustangs with 6 1/2 quarterback sacks for 50 yards in losses. Hyatt also had 47 tackles on the season for 64 tackle points.

Riehl led Heppner against Pilot Rock with 13 tackles for 22 total defensive points, also leading Heppner. Riehl also added one quarterback sack.

For the second straight season Riehl led the Mustangs with 131 tackles. Riehl was also in the top five in the CBC in tackle points with 132 and had a total of 151 for the season.
