

Ten Mustangs gain all-star spots

Senior Bob Riehl gained Heppner's only Columbia Basin Conference all-star first team selection last Wednesday night when CBC coaches voted in Boardman. He was named first team defensive lineman. Riehl was also a second team choice at offensive tackle.

Sophomore Dick Devin, who led the league with eight interceptions, was a second team defensive back choice while Joe Taylor was named honorable mention defensive back.

Senior Troy Hyatt was a second team defensive end and senior David Pedro was a second team linebacker. Pedro was also an honorable mention pick at running back.

Another senior running back, Scott Buschke, was an honorable mention selection as was senior Kevin Curnutt at center. Senior Jason Palmer rounded out the Heppner selections by receiving honorable mention at linebacker for the second year in a row.

Champion Wahtonka dominated the CBC all-star teams. The Eagles received 16 all-star selections, picking up eight offensively and eight defensively. Riverside, the other team that made the state playoffs from the CBC, had only three players selected, all from the defensive side.

Stanfield and Heppner followed Wahtonka with 11 and 10 selections respectively. Umatilla and Weston-McEwen received nine selections, Pilot Rock five, and Sherman County and Wasco County had three choices apiece.

Five players made the first team on both offense and defense. They were Jamie Baucum, Jay Collier, and Scott Carty of Wahtonka and Brent Morris and Norm Stewart of Stanfield.

USDA announces 1987 feed grain program provisions

Secretary of Agriculture Richard E. Lyng has announced a voluntary paid land diversion for the 1987 feed grain program.

Those choosing to participate in the paid diversion will be required to divert 15 percent of their feed grain acreage base to acreage conservation reserve, Lyng said. He said diversion payment rates per bushel are: corn, \$2; sorghum, \$1.90; barley, \$1.60; and oats, \$0.80. Fifty percent of the diversion payment will be paid in advance, with half in cash and the balance in generic commodity certificates.

The voluntary 15 percent paid diversion in combination with the 20 percent acreage reduction announced Sept. 29 gives producers the opportunity to set aside 35% of their feed grain base acreage.

Secretary Lyng said the 1987 per bushel established target prices for feed grains will be the same as for the 1986 crops—\$3.03 for corn, \$2.88 for sorghum, \$2.60 for barley, \$1.60 for oats.
