Roy Quackenbush, 77, a longtime resident of the Heppner area, died Tuesday, Nov. 4, 1986 at the University of Oregon Health Sciences Center in Portland.

He was born March 22, 1909, at Alturas, Calif., the son of Rowena (Nay) and Richard Quackenbush. He moved to this area in 1913.

In 1930 he married Melba Hughes in Heppner.

Mr. Quackenbush was noted for his banjo playing in many groups in the area. He and his wife owned and operated the Red & White Grocery in Heppner for many years. After retiring, he assisted his daughter and son-in-law in their grocery store in Lexington. An excellent horseman who loved to hunt and fish, he was also noted for his cooking. He was a member of the Heppner Masonic Lodge, and a past master. He also was a member of the Heppner IOOF.

Funeral services were held Friday, Nov. 7 at 2 p.m. at the United Methodist Church, with the Rev. Grace Drake officiating, and Carley Drake as organist. A duet, "What a Day That Will Be", was sung by Harley Sager and Ira Owen.

To the Editor:  
My story is a lot like other parents except they are afraid to do anything to get help. I'm 29 and the mother of three children ages 12, nine, and one year old. They were taken away from me in January. In April I took my two sons and ran away with them. We were doing fine until October 20, when the state police came and took them away from me again. I feel the only reason this is happening to me is because I don't have the money to fight like so many other people do not.

They don't care if they drive you emotionally crazy or our children. Their only concern is that you are separated from one another. They don't care if they hurt the children either if they did they wouldn't

separate us in the first place. They could've sent someone to my home to check on things. I'm twenty nine years old. I'm not a child; I'm an adult quite capable of caring for my children, more capable than foster parents who get paid for caring for my children.

Please let me be heard. So many children are getting hurt because Child Protection doesn't care what the children want. They say they don't like separating families that they are doing what's best. Well, I say, bull. The best thing is for our families to stay together. Please, I believe, and so do others, that this cannot go on. Please hear me and help me
