Mr. and Mrs. Heiner worked with the Interchurch Response for the Horn of Africa in 1981-82. From 1929-77 they served as missionaries in Chile and Bolivia. She worked with the local Bolivian churches and served as house-mother for other missionary youth.

She worked as a clinic nurse in Chile at the El Vergel Experimental Farm and in neighboring communities, and in the hospital in Valdivia, Chile.

Originally from Elk River, Idaho, Peggy Heiner studied nursing in

by Montana, where she worked in the church and community and hospital.

"The rich experiences gained by working side by side with the people of Bolivia, Chile, Nicaragua and the refugees of Somalia have greatly enriched our lives and grounded our faith," Mrs. Heiner said, "and we have been with them in times of happiness and great distress. We find that Christ, indeed, breaks down the dividing walls of hostility and the love we develop with our Christian (or Moslem) friends unites us in the building of the kingdom."
