

# Heppner athletes awarded

Heppner High School held its annual fall sports dessert last Tuesday night to honor its football and volleyball players.

First-year "C" team volleyball coach Susan Hisler presented awards of participation to junior Marcie Stookey, sophomores Melissa McCurry and Sue Plocharsky; and freshmen Mary Connor, Angela Lewiston, Jennifer Martin, Kelly McLaughlin, Mary Osmin, Lana Schmidt, and Joana Welch.

The team's "Most Valuable Player" was Welch; Martin earned "Most Improved." McLaughlin grabbed "Most Inspirational," McCurry a "Miss Hustle Award," and Welch "Most Coachable."

The "C" team Fillies finished the season 1-7, but the most important aspect of the "C" team program wasn't winning according to Hisler. "Developing a skill level is very important at the 'C' team level," she said.

Hisler then presented junior varsity volleyball awards for participation to senior Sheri Piper, juniors Kim Bond and J.J. Osmin; sophomores Michelle Beck, Jill Conklin, Tami Lindsay, Christy Stroeber, Michelle Wallis, and Nance Wright; and freshman Jennifer Currin.

Earning extra awards from Hisler were Wright, "Most Valuable Player"; Piper "Most Improved"; Bond and Currin "Miss Hustle"; Stroeber, the team's "Floor Leader"; and Conklin, Currin, and Wallis earned the team's "Utility Awards."

"This was a very enjoyable group to work with," Hisler said. "We didn't always have the same people all the time so we never really found any continuity."

Terri Gentry, first-year varsity volleyball coach, then presented awards to her team. Senior Missy Eubanks was the team's lone second-year letter winner. Those lettering for the first time included seniors Kellie Brannon, Tina Davidson, Tareena Nash, and Cindy Stroeber; juniors Jeanie Fitzsimmons and Shannon McLaughlin, and

sophomores Tami Lindsay, Sandi Turner, and Nance Wright.

Eubanks and Davidson were the team's "co-Most Valuable Players," Nash "Most Improved," Brannon "Most Inspirational," Stroeber "Most Coachable," and Turner received a "Golden Arm" award for serving.

Eubanks was a first team Eastern Division all-star selection, Davidson a second team all-division pick, with Nash and Stroeber receiving honorable mention selections.

"We started out slow, but peaked in league play," Gentry said. The varsity volleyball team finished 4-4 in league play and 5-7 overall.

Junior varsity football coach Les Payne and Steve Brownfield then presented junior varsity football awards of presentation to sophomores Jerry Brosnan, Brian Kollman, Mike Scalf and Ted Schwarz; and freshmen Phil Estberg, Danny Lindsay, Jason Maben, Slater Mitchell, Casey Pedro and Cory Rill. The JV team finished 2-3-1.

Head football coach Tim Birkby then gave out letters to his players. Senior Bob Riehl was the team's only fourth-year letterman. Third-year lettermen were seniors Scott Buschke, Kevin Curnutt, Scott Dougherty, Troy Hyatt, David Pedro, Jason Palmer, and Joe Taylor; and junior Scott Jones. Second-year lettermen were seniors Gene Harris and Arkie Smith, junior Gene Lancaster; and sophomores Dick Devin and Bryan Padberg. First-year lettermen included juniors Scott Davis and Doug Marlatt; sophomores Craig Angell, Jim Brosnan, Jess Jeffreys, Barney Lindsay, Mike Mahoney, and Jess Osmin; and freshmen Russell Britt and Dean Munkers. Freshman Eric Connor was the team's manager.

Palmer, Pedro, Riehl, and Taylor were honored as the team's captains. Pedro was the team's "Most Valuable Player" and "Best Back." Palmer was the team's "Best Lineman," Taylor "Most Inspirational," and Devin "Most Improved."

Riehl was a first-team Columbia Basin Conference defensive lineman and second team offensive lineman; Devin a second team defensive back; Hyatt a second team defensive end; Pedro a second team linebacker and honorable mention running back; Buschke an honorable mention running back; Curnutt an honorable mention center; Palmer an honorable mention linebacker; and Taylor an honorable mention back.

The Mustangs finished fourth in the CBC with a 5-3 record and were 5-4 overall.
