

Fillies outshine Dayville Devils

In a galaxy of stars, Heppner's Missy Eubanks outshone Dayville's Paula Berry last Saturday night as the Fillies flashed past the Class "B" Devils 52-48. Heppner improved to 4-1 in the season.
Eubanks made 14 of 23 field goals and 5 of 5 free throws for a career-

high 33 points. She also had 19 rebounds, just three shy of her career-high, handed out five assists and had four steals.
Berry made 15 field goals enroute to a game-high 36 points but was only 6 of 24 at the free throw line.
Behind 14 points from Berry, the Devils took a 15-12 first quarter lead. But Berry and the Devils wasted several opportunities as she was 2 of 6 in the quarter at the line and Dayville 3-7.
Eubanks who had six points in each of the first two quarters, led the Fillies back to a 22-22 tie in the second quarter as the Devils were 1 of 6 from the stripe.
In the second half the Eubanks-Berry act continued.
Eubanks had 21 points and 14 rebounds in the second half and Berry had 18 points.
With Eubanks scoring 11 points in the third period, Heppner took a 36-35 lead over Dayville who received 7 points from Berry. Despite their lead, the Fillies lost starters Tina Davidson and Cindy

Stroeber who fouled out.
However, the Devils couldn't take advantage as they were 5 of 18 at the foul line in the quarter. Berry in particular was a woeful 3 of 14 at the line in the quarter.
Eubanks netted 10 points in the fourth quarter as the Fillies had a 16-13 advantage in the quarter on their way to the win. Berry had 11 points in the quarter despite her poor free throw performance.

Pioneers end Fillies winning Streak

In a battle of heavyweights the Class "AA" Mac-Hi Pioneers knocked out the Class "A" Heppner Fillies from the unbeaten ranks last Tuesday night with a 33-25 victory.
Both teams were dead even in the opening period which ended in a tie, 8-8. Missy Eubanks had all eight of Heppner's points while Shawna Birdwell had seven for Mac-Hi in the period.
The Fillies controlled the second quarter 7-6 and led 15-14 at halftime.
Heppner sank 10 of 34 field goals for the game for 29 percent but were only 3 of 15 in the second half, 20 percent, and struggled offensively throughout the second half.
The Pioneers struggled as well but did score enough to lead 22-18 after three quarters, as Heppner went over six minutes without scoring, and come out on top, by a 33-25 count, at game's end.
Eubanks led all scorers with 18 points but scored only 6 in the second half as only two other Fillies scored.

state powers as Heppner is defending Class "A" state champion and the Pioneers were fourth in the Class "AA" state tournament a year ago.
Heppner defeated Dayville last Saturday night (see related story) and are off until January 2 when they'll travel to Milton Freewater for a rematch with Mac-Hi at 7:30 p.m.
The Fillies will then conclude their pre-season slate by hosting the Sherman County Huskies at approximately 4:30 p.m. on January 3.
The Huskies have been a dominant force in girls District 7-A basketball in recent years.

In 1984 Sherman County finished second in the Class "A" state tournament and has battled Heppner the last three years in the District 7-A championship game.
The Huskies lost four of five starters and five of their top six players to graduation but have had a good pre-season and are led by senior Tammy Conner and juniors Penny Brown and Jill Conlee.

Mustang frosh fail to overtake Pirates

After opening their season with a 51-40 victory a week earlier over the Riverside Pirates, Heppner's freshmen boys basketball team dropped a 44-26 decision to the same team last Tuesday night.
After pulling within 31-26 at the close of the third quarter, Heppner was shutout 13-0 in the final frame as the Pirates capped the 44-26 win.
"We lost our poise in the fourth quarter," Heppner coach John Boyer said. "We were a half step slow all night."
The Mustangs started the game in fine fashion, and sparked behind the inside play of Eric Connor and Ryan Miller, took a 14-13 lead after one quarter. The Pirate defense stiffened in the second period and allowed Heppner only three points en route to a 25-17 halftime advantage.
Russell Britt brought the Mustangs

back in the third quarter with six points to pull the Mustangs within five points before the disastrous final period.

Mustangs trample Dayville Devils

Heppner's boys basketball led from start to finish and routed the Dayville Devils 62-34 last Saturday night. With the win the Mustangs are now 3-1.
A full-court press, Bryan Padberg and Wayne Wilgers led Heppner in the first quarter. After leading only 6-4 the Mustangs used their press to close out the quarter with a 12-2 run to lead 18-6. Padberg tallied 11 points in the quarter and Wilgers 6 more.
In the second period Heppner continued to play its up-tempo fast break brand of basketball and used seven points from Wilgers to increase its lead to 32-15 at halftime.
Padberg and Wilgers, with six points each, scored all 12 of the Mustangs third quarter points to enter the fourth period with 44-23 margin.
Padberg led all scorers with a career-high 23 points including a clip of 11 of 16 from the field. Wilgers added 21 points for the Mustangs.
Verne Olson and Joe Lewis topped the Devils with 10 and 9 points respectively.
Wilgers led the team with 10 rebounds while he, Padberg Gene Garrett and Dick Devin each handed out 4 assists. Padberg had a team high nine steals and added seven rebounds.
The Mustangs set season-highs in numerous categories en route to the win.
Heppner had season-highs in field goals made (26), field goal percentage (46 percent), points (62), rebounds (53), assists (22), and steals (23).

This weekend Heppner will compete in the Mac-Hi Christmas Tournament on Friday and Saturday.
Boys action will begin at 5 p.m. when Riverview, a Class "A" school from Washington meets Class "AA" Baker. At 9 p.m. Heppner will meet Class "AA" host Mac-Hi.
Last season Heppner fell 46-40 to Mac-Hi in the championship game while Riverview finished fourth. The Baker boys will be making their inaugural performance.
The Mac-Hi Pioneers are led by the inside play of Chris Cockburn and Jim Parsons and the outside play of point guard Cam Albee.
Mac-Hi has had a good pre-season thus far including a 71-48 thrashing of Riverside last Tuesday night. Heppner lost 58-55 to Riverside on Dec. 6 in the championship final of the Morrow County Invitational Tournament.
Boys action on Saturday will start at 3:30 p.m. with the losers of Friday's games battling for third place. At 7:30 p.m. Friday's winners will square off for the tournament championship.

Heppner's freshmen boys basketball team mauled the lone junior varsity last Thursday night, 66-35.
Doing the clawing was freshman sensation Russell Britt who exploded for 32 points in three quarters of action as the Mustangs improved to 2-1 on the season. "We came ready to play," Heppner coach John Boyer said. "Our intensity level was excellent both offensively and defensively."
Heppner came out in the first period and took a 16-7 lead behind seven points from Britt and six from Slater Mitchell. Britt popped 11 points in the second quarter as the Mustangs increased their margin to 34-14 by intermission.
In the third period the Cardinals were held scoreless until the 2-46
