The week that was the last full week of 1986 surely held several outstanding days. On Tuesday morning, Dec. 23, the aircraft Voyager came out of the southern skies and returned non-stop pilots Dick Rutan and Jeana Yeager to the soil of California which they had left nine days and some minutes before to successfully circle the earth. The unusual plane designed by Bert Rutan was a homemade, private enterprise and along with the Rutan brothers and Ms. Yeager there were 40 to 50 unpaid volunteers working on this record-breaking venture of approximately 26,000 miles.

Voyagers flight should thrill Americans and all others who are excited about possible new developments in aviation. How small the world has become since reporter Nellie Bly made her non-flying, eighty-day trip around it so many years ago.

In the wee hours of Thursday, Dec. 25, an even more remarkable flight came out of the northern skies. This flight was powered by nine very well-known reindeer under the leadership of red-nosed Rudolph, and it was piloted by Santa Claus. Instead of carrying 9,500 lbs. of fuel, it carried a tremendous load of toys and other gifts on its round-the-world journey.

This was not a first-flight adventure and Mr. Claus had many stops to make. His nine faithful reindeer had to wait quietly on rooftops or in yards while he slid down chimneys or slipped through the doors of a great variety of homes where he deposited his labeled packages under Christmas trees. He was pleased to find cookies and milk and sometimes carrots for himself and his crew at some of his stopping places during his busiest night of the year. Santa must have traveled even further than Voyager's 26,000 miles, and we are all so glad he doesn't make non-stop trips.

On Sunday, Dec. 21, we passed the shortest day of the year, the winter solstice, the point-in-time when the sun ceases to recede from the equator and is momentarily at its farthest distance from that imaginary earth-circling belt. So from now on our northern hemisphere will see lengthening days and more warmth and sunshine.

Hasn't it been delightful to receive attractive Christmas cards and annual messages from family and friends during these winter days? As my years race by I enjoy this feature of the holidays more and more and dislike removing the cards I have been displaying all over my home and tucking them away, just like most of us dislike seeing the town's lovely, lighted tree, the street lights and the displays in stores and churches get tucked away.

It is good to know that the Heppner Hotel remodeling project is moving ahead. Planning is completed and now it is necessary to locate a contractor who will begin building so that the senior apartments can be ready to be occupied early in 1988.
